



Planning for Main Streets Survey Summary

April 2026



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Introduction

The Planning for Main Streets project is a regional effort led by SCAG, in partnership with Caltrans and local jurisdictions, to reimagine state highway corridors that also function as community main streets. Through this project, SCAG and partners aim to address transportation inequities, improve safety and mobility for all users, and align infrastructure with everyday needs of community members, workers, and visitors.

The project aims to transform four state route (SR) corridors into people-centered places that balance transportation needs with community well-being.

The four state routes are:

1. SR 1 (Pacific Coast Highway), between Pennsylvania Avenue and Harbor Avenue/I-710 Ramps (6.5 miles) in the cities of Los Angeles, Lomita, and Long Beach
2. SR 18 (Waterman Avenue), between Arrowhead Road and 30th Street (2 miles) in the city of San Bernardino
3. SR 39 (Beach Boulevard), between Starr Street and Hazard Avenue (4.5 miles) in the cities of Westminster and Stanton
4. SR 86 (Main Street/1st Street/Brawley Avenue), between Las Flores Drive and Legion Road (2 miles) in the city of Brawley

Project Survey Overview

As part of the project's community engagement efforts, surveys were developed to gather feedback from community members and stakeholders on corridor priorities and needs. Surveys were active from Dec. 1, 2025, to Feb. 6, 2026, and were distributed and promoted digitally by the project team through local partner social media channels and email lists. A survey was created for each corridor, and Spanish and Vietnamese versions were available depending on local area demographics and language needs. Collectively, there were 481 *completed* survey responses: *

- SR-1: 139 (138 in English, one in Spanish)
- SR-18: 186 (all in English)
- SR-39: 130 (126 English, four in Spanish)
- SR-86: 30 (all in English)

**Although there were 485 total initiated responses, 481 were fully completed as some respondents only completed some questions but not the full survey.*

Several key themes emerged regarding travel behavior, corridor use, safety concerns, and desired improvements. The following summarizes the primary insights gathered from survey participants for each corridor.

Key Survey Findings, by Corridor

SR-1 PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY:

Travel Destinations: Most respondents reported traveling along Pacific Coast Highway (SR-1) often or always. Common destinations include Narbonne Avenue and Oak Street, in Lomita, and Crenshaw Boulevard, which has a large shopping center located within the City of Torrance. Narbonne Avenue and Oak Street are primarily collector streets which contain several residential uses, high density housing, and other neighborhood-serving uses, in contrast to Crenshaw Boulevard which has large shopping centers and retail activity.

Mode and Travel Behavior: About half of the respondents reported that they primarily drive, and 20 percent walk to reach their primary destinations. Of the top reasons that respondents travel along the corridor, shopping/dining and commuting to work make up half of the trips. Close to 50 percent of respondents travel alone or with their partner/spouse.

Of all respondents, only 13 percent noted that it is convenient to take transit. The majority noted that they do not take transit mainly because they own their own vehicle and transit is generally inconvenient due to their long commuting distances.

Walkability and Transit Feasibility: About 63 percent of respondents indicated that the street environment (relating to street/sidewalk conditions, lighting, and shading) is not comfortable. Of all respondents, just under 70 percent noted that walking/bike conditions were not comfortable due to high vehicle speeds, societal factors such as a larger unhoused population, and a lack of bicycle facilities.

Safety Concerns: Intersections near Western Avenue, Narbonne Avenue, and Eshelman Avenue were most frequently identified as locations where respondents feel unsafe in terms of traffic and personal safety.

Shade and Green Space: Most respondents (67 percent) reported that shade and green space are very important, with street intersections with Narbonne Avenue, Western Avenue, and Eshelman Avenue identified as areas needing improved greening.

Priority Improvements: Respondents had the option of choosing their top three improvements, which resulted in 356 total responses to this question. Of the 356 total responses, 59 (17 percent) were for improved sidewalk maintenance, 53 were for more convenient bicycle facilities (15 percent), and 48 (13 percent) were for treatments that slow vehicle speeds.

SR-18 WATERMAN AVENUE:

Travel Destinations: Most respondents reported traveling along Waterman Avenue very frequently, with over 80 percent indicating they always or often use the corridor. Common destinations include Stater Brothers, Starbucks, and nearby parks, particularly near Highland Avenue and Sierra Avenue.

Mode and Travel Behavior: About 84 percent of respondents reported that they primarily drive, and 7 percent walk to reach their primary destinations. Of the top reasons that respondents travel along the corridor, shopping/dining and commuting to work make up half of the trips. Just over half of respondents reported that they travel on their own or with their spouses/family members. Of all respondents, half do not take transit and about 20 percent noted it was not convenient to take transit along the corridor.

Walkability and Transit Feasibility: Over 80 percent of the respondents indicated that the overall street environment (sidewalk conditions, lighting, shading) is not comfortable. Of all respondents, nearly 75

percent noted that walking/bike conditions were not comfortable due to, high vehicle speeds, societal factors such as a larger unhoused population, and a lack of bicycle facilities.

Safety Concerns: Intersections near Baseline Street, Marshall Boulevard, and Highland Avenue, were most frequently identified as locations where respondents feel unsafe in terms of traffic safety. Wildwood Park, Parkside Elementary School, and the intersection with Parkdale Drive were identified as being unsafe from a personal safety perspective.

Shade & Green Space: Most respondents (67 percent) reported that shade and green space are very important, with Baseline Street, Marshall Avenue, and Wildwood Park being listed as areas of higher priority for greening.

Priority Improvements: Respondents had the option of choosing their top three improvements, which resulted in 495 total responses to this question. Of the 495 total responses, 88 (18 percent) were for new sidewalks along Waterman Avenue, 81 (16 percent) were for new lighting, and 63 (13 percent) were for treatments that slow vehicle speeds.

SR-39 BEACH BOULEVARD:

Travel Destinations: Most respondents reported traveling along Beach Boulevard very frequently, with over 80 percent indicating they always or often use the corridor. Common destinations include Walmart (just south of SR-91), destinations along Katella Avenue, and the Rodeo 39 Public Market near Garden Grove Boulevard.

Mode and Travel Behavior: About 73 percent of respondents reported that they primarily drive, while 12 percent walk to reach their primary destinations. Of the top reasons that respondents travel along the corridor, shopping/dining and commuting to work make up half of the trips. Just over half of respondents reported that they travel on their own or with their spouses/family members. Of all respondents, about 44 percent do not take transit and about 25 percent noted it was not convenient to take transit along the corridor.

Walkability and Transit Feasibility: Nearly 70 percent of the respondents indicated that the overall street environment (e.g., sidewalk conditions, lighting, shading) is not comfortable. Of all respondents, 60 percent noted that walking/bike conditions were not comfortable due to high vehicle speeds, societal factors such as a larger unhoused population, and a lack of bicycle facilities.

Safety Concerns: Intersections near Ball Street, Katella Avenue, and Garden Grove Boulevard, were most frequently identified as locations where respondents feel unsafe in terms of traffic safety. Ball Street, Cerritos Avenue, and Garden Grove Boulevard were identified as being unsafe from a personal safety perspective.

Shade and Green Space: Most respondents (66 percent) reported that shade and green space are very important, with the intersections with Cerritos Avenue, Chapman Avenue, and Katella Avenue being listed as areas of higher priority for greening.

Priority Improvements: Respondents had the option of choosing their top three improvements, which resulted in 321 total responses to this question. Of the 321 total responses, 117 (36 percent) were for new and/or improved street lighting, 53 (17 percent) were for better sidewalk maintenance, and 35 (11 percent) were for new bicycle facilities.

SR-86 MAIN STREET/1ST STREET/BRAWLEY AVENUE:

Travel Destinations: Most respondents reported traveling along SR-86 very frequently, with over 90 percent indicating they always or often use the corridor. Common destinations include Walmart (off Wildcat Drive, near the south city limit), Vons (near the west city limit), and nearby parks.

Mode and Travel Behavior: About 56 percent of respondents reported that they primarily drive, while 28 percent walk to reach their primary destinations. Of the top reasons that respondents travel along the corridor, shopping/dining and personal services make up half of the trips. Just over half of respondents reported that they travel on their own or with their spouses/family members. Of all respondents, about 62 percent do not take transit and about 14 percent noted it was not convenient to take transit along the corridor.

Walkability and Transit Feasibility: About 50 percent of the respondents indicated that the overall street environment (e.g. sidewalk conditions, lighting, shading) is not comfortable. Of all respondents, 52 percent noted that walking/bike conditions were not comfortable due to high vehicle speeds and a lack of sidewalks, crossing opportunities, and bicycle facilities.

Safety Concerns: Locations identified as unsafe from a traffic safety perspective were: 1) the intersection of Main Street and 1st Street, near Downtown Brawley, and 2) several locations along Brawley Avenue, south of K Street; presumably due to the lack of sidewalk facilities, lighting, and street crossing opportunities. Brawley Avenue (south of K Street) and was identified as being unsafe from a personal safety perspective.

Shade and Green Space: Most respondents (79 percent) reported that shade and green space are very important, with locations along Brawley Avenue, the areas fronting the Walmart, and nearby schools such as Witter Elementary being listed as areas of higher priority for greening.

Priority Improvements: Respondents had the option of choosing their top three improvements, which resulted in 78 total responses to this question. Of the 78 total responses, 17 (22 percent) were for new sidewalks, 15 (19 percent) were for new lighting, and 12 (15 percent) were for new bicycle facilities.

The next section expands and provides a detailed analysis of the survey results.

SR-1: Lomita, Los Angeles, and Long Beach

The survey for SR-1 (Pacific Coast Highway) had a total of 139 survey responses, with 138 in English, and one in Spanish. *Please note that this represents the total number of entries (including partial survey completions). The numbers below may differ as not all questions were answered by respondents.*

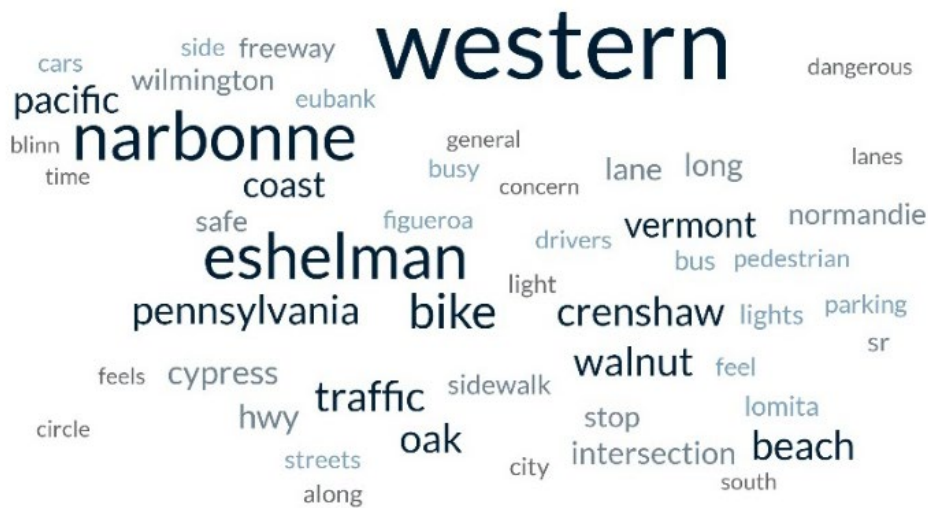


Respondents noted not walking and biking due to high vehicle speeds, the lack of bike facilities, and concentration of unhoused individuals.

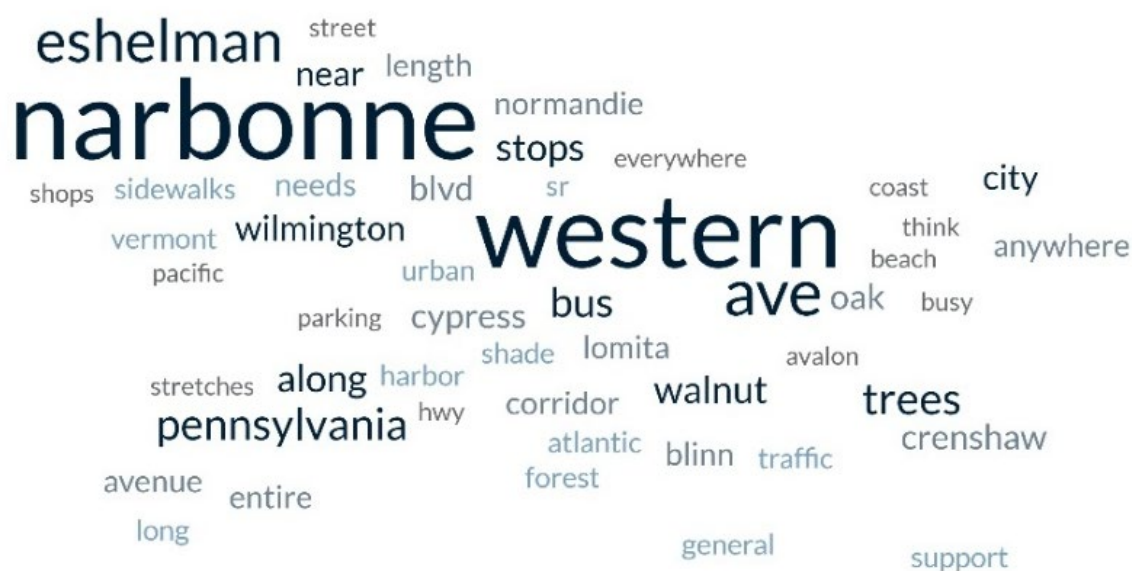

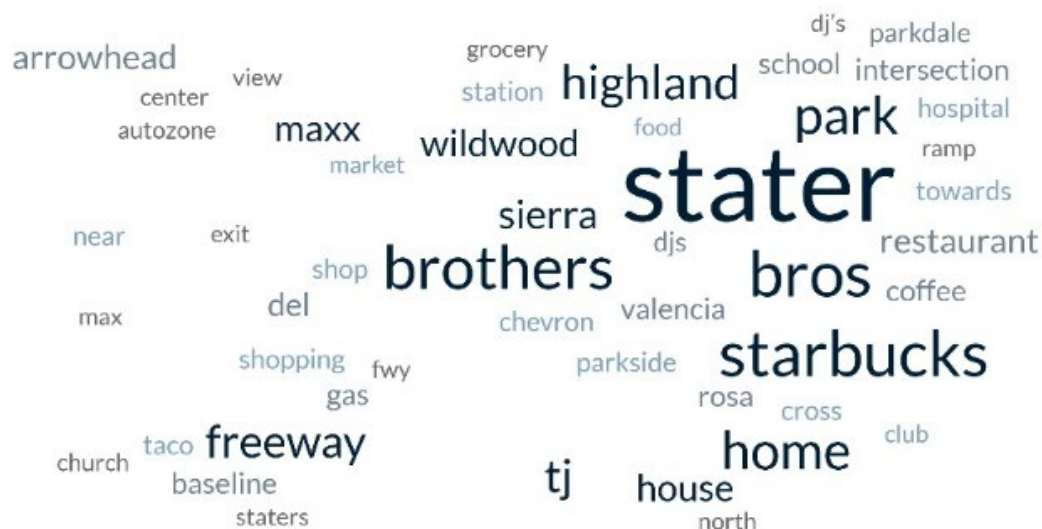

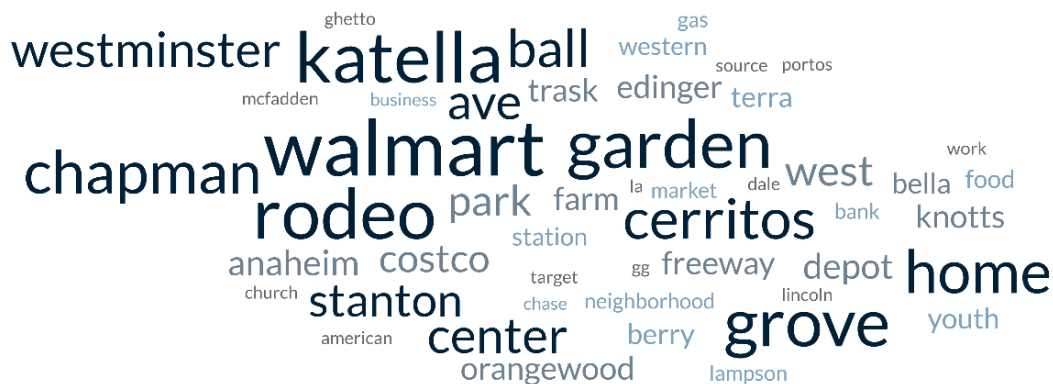

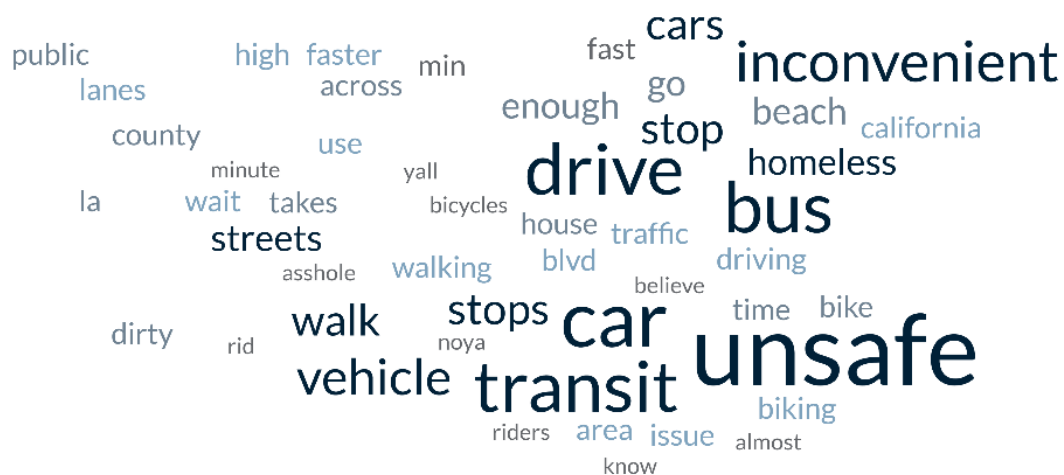

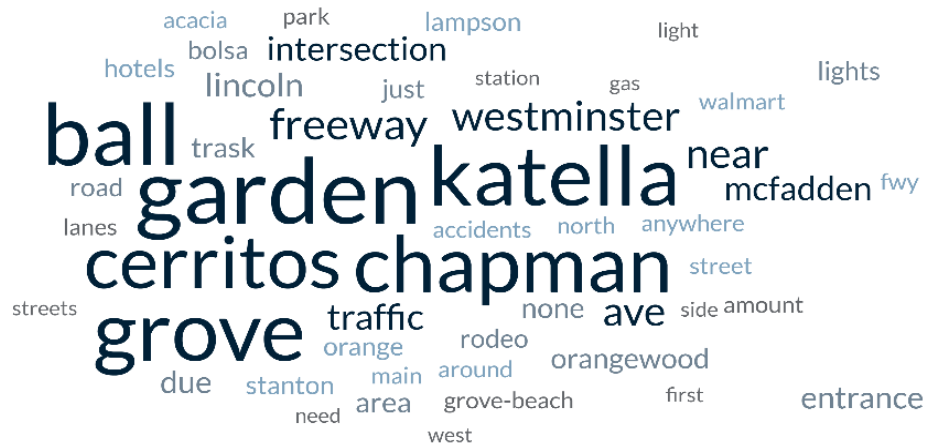


Respondents who prefer not to walk or bike noted concerns about the unhoused population, the lack of bicycling infrastructure, and high vehicle speeds along the corridor.

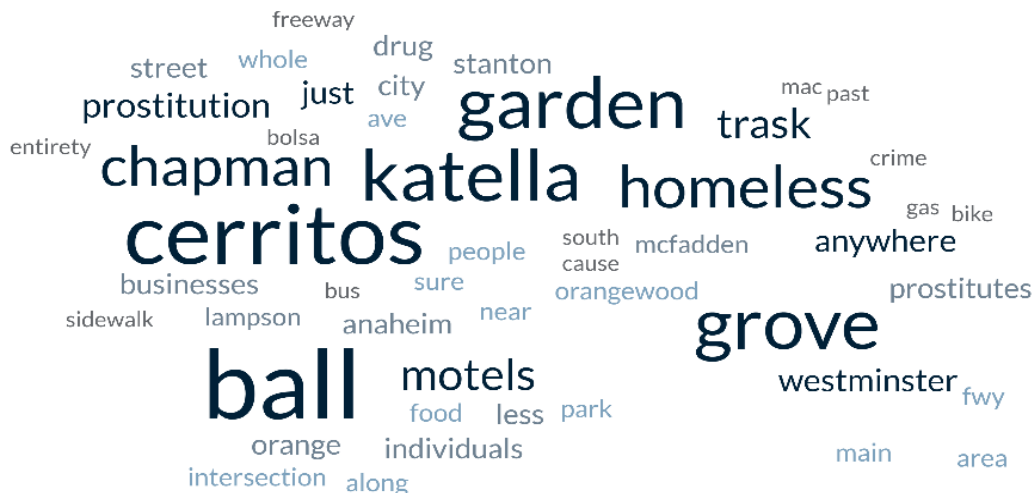

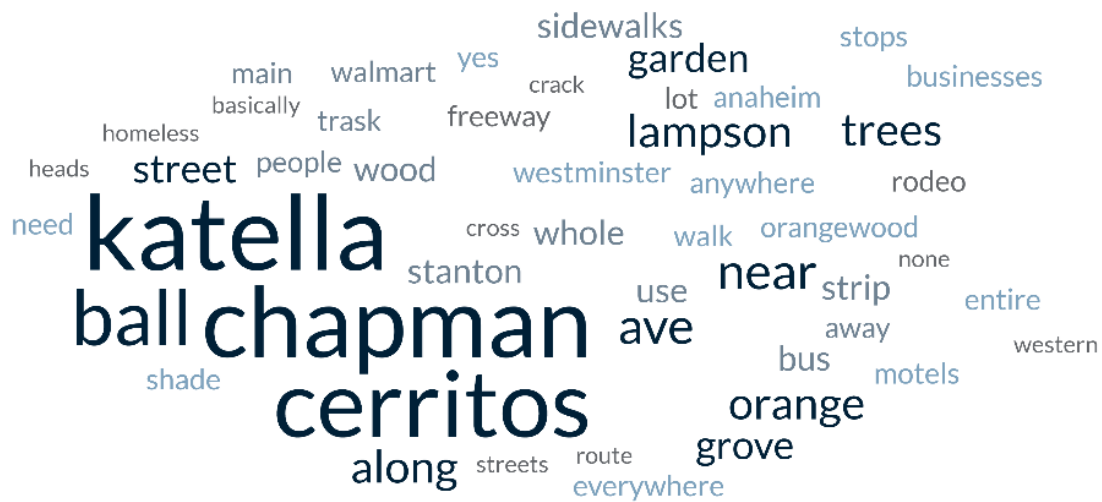

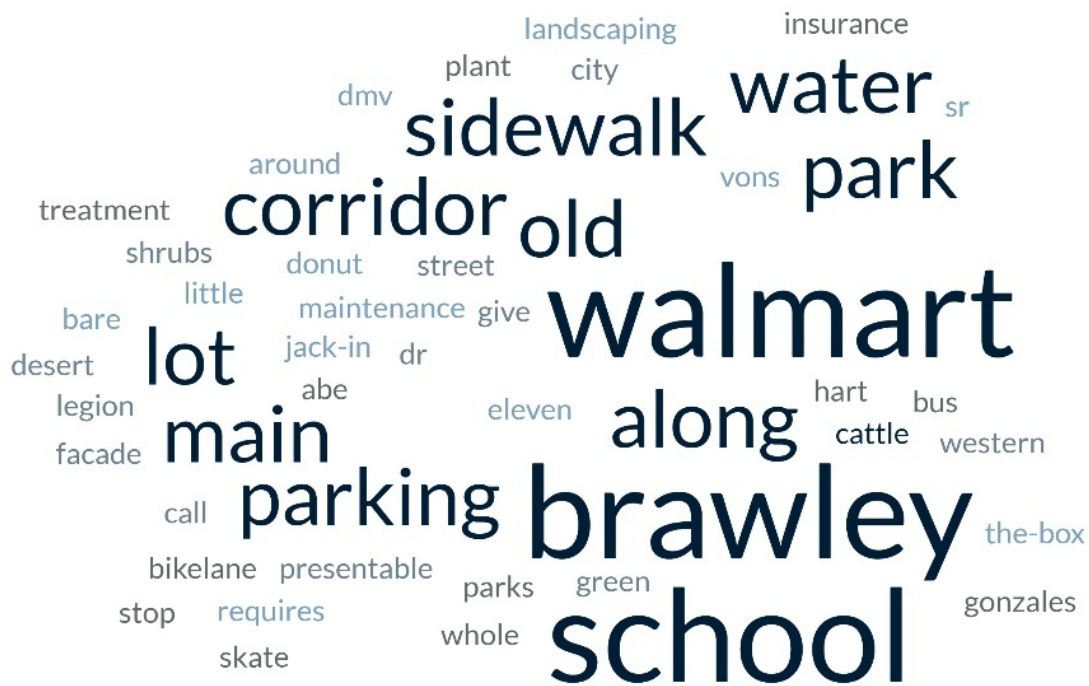
