REAP 2.0

The Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Grants of 2021 (or REAP 2.0) is a \$600 million program administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), in collaboration with the Governor’s Office of Planning and Research (OPR), the Strategic Growth Council (SGC), and the California Air Resources Board (CARB). REAP 2.0 is designed to accelerate progress towards California housing and climate goals through strengthened partnerships with local governments, Tribes, and State and regional governments.

REAP 2.0 funding has three objectives:

1. Accelerate infill housing,
2. Support efforts for Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (AFFH), and
3. Reduce vehicle miles traveled (VMT).

Under the REAP 2.0 program, SCAG is set to receive \$246 million in State funding. SCAG will sub-allocate a large portion of these funds (via grants) to eligible entities in the SCAG region to implement Connect SoCal, our regional vision to address transportation and land use strategies that help the region achieve sustainability goals.

SCAG’S CORE PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- > Leverage and augment the Connect SoCal Implementation Strategy
- > Support 6th cycle RHNA goals
- > Vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reduction
- > Demonstrate consistency with the Racial Equity Early Action Plan
- > Promote infill development in Connect SoCal identified Priority Growth Areas

SCAG is dedicated to broad representation across all of our programs, including communities that have historically not been engaged or had opportunities to participate, are under-resourced and/or represent SCAG’s Priority Populations—such as Tribal communities, environmental justice, and historically disadvantaged communities.



ABOUT SCAG'S REAP 2.0 PROGRAMS

SCAG's REAP 2.0 program is divided in three program areas:

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RESOURCES TO IMPLEMENT CONNECT SOCAL 2020

SCAG's REAP 2.0 programs are designed to implement Connect SoCal 2020, SCAG's Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy. Connect SoCal is a long-range visioning plan that balances future mobility and housing needs with economic and environmental goals. It set the stage for the region's ambitious housing plan to accommodate 1.3 million new housing units and includes new mobility strategies to enhance accessibility without adding auto trips. SCAG's REAP 2.0 programs support transformative planning and implementation activities that realize these objectives by providing resources to local cities, counties, transportation agencies and other partners to implement Connect SoCal 2020.

USING DATA FOR PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

SCAG offers data tools for program applicants to develop strong proposals. SCAG's Regional Data Platform (RDP) provides data and planning templates and tools – such as the Housing Element Parcel (HELPR) and Local Data Exchange (LDX) tools. SCAG's RDP also provides access to Streetlight, a travel behavior, and trends data platform. Streetlight provides access to real-time, anonymized, and aggregated information, sourced from mobile data and sensors, for the six-county region. These tools can be used to develop baseline data and performance metrics that strengthen proposals to SCAG's REAP 2.0 programs.

SCAG's REAP 2.0 program will expand support and training for local jurisdictions to use the RDP, as well as provide additional features and functions to help further align local efforts with regional goals through performance dashboarding features.
