DC Update and Policy Lookahead

- Congress returned this month to resume work on several pending items, including government funding.
- **Supplemental Request:** Lawmakers remain at an impasse over supplemental assistance for Ukraine and Israel, as Republicans have demanded immigration policy changes in exchange for their support.
- President's FY25 Budget Request: The release of the President's FY25 budget request in Q1 2024 will kick off the annual appropriations process. Congress will begin drafting appropriations bills and gathering community project funding requests.
- **FAA Reauthorization:** On December 20, the Senate cleared a temporary FAA authorization extension, which ensures that the agency can receive funding through March 2024.
- **Other items:** Farm Bill, National Defense Authorization Act, Water Resources Development Act, among others.

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FY24 Appropriations Update

- Appropriations: On November 15, 2023, Congress passed a twotiered continuing resolution (CR). The CR allows the federal government to be funded at FY23 levels giving Congress more time to pass all 12 appropriations bills. The laddered CR is outlined as follows:
 - First Deadline (Jan. 19): Agriculture-FDA, Energy and Water, Military Construction-VA, and Transportation-HUD
 - Second Deadline (February 2): Commerce-Justice-Science, Defense, Financial Services, Homeland Security, Interior-Environment, Labors-HHS-Education, Legislative Branch, State-Foreign Operations

FY24 Appropriations Update Cont.

- Bipartisan negotiators reached a deal this month on FY24 top line spending levels at \$1.59 trillion (\$886 billion for defense and \$772 billion for nondefense) for the 12 spending bills.
- However, they still have limited runway, as Congress must meet key funding deadlines of January 19 and February 2 to prevent a government shutdown.

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"While these final spending levels will not satisfy everyone...this deal does provide us a path to: 1) move the process forward; 2) reprioritize funding within the topline towards conservative objectives, instead of last year's Schumer-Pelosi omnibus; and 3) fight for the important policy riders included in our House FY24 bills."

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Direct Pay Option for Tax-Exempt Organizations (IRA Tax Credits)

- Prior to IRA, many tax-exempt organizations (including local governments) could not fully benefit from tax credits, such as those that incentivize clean energy infrastructure/deployment.
- Within IRA, the direct pay (also known as "elective pay") feature allows tax-exempt and governmental entities to receive elective payments for 12 clean energy tax credits.
- Direct pay is a game changer in how local governments can maximize their earning potential in federal funds to expand clean energy infrastructure.

Surface Transportation Reauthorization 2025

- Every 5 years, Congress passes legislation to authorize Federal surface transportation programs for improving infrastructure including highways, bridges, mass transit, rail, and transportation safety.
- The current surface transportation authorization, within the BIL, authorizes funding for surface transportation programs from 2021 to 2026.
- Congressional committees are beginning to think about the next surface transportation authorization package — collecting ideas, holding hearings, etc. Holland & Knight will continue to provide updates as this legislation develops, as well as strategy for advocating for language that is aligned with SCAG's interests in surface transportation.

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2024 Political Lookahead: Congress

- House: Elections for representatives of all 435 congressional districts, as well as 6 non-voting delegates from the District of Columbia and the inhabited U.S. territories, will take place in 2024.
 - 38 Reps. (21 Ds, 17 Rs) have announced their retirements or intent to run for another office.
 - With redistricting and tight national polls, the House forecast remains a toss up.
- Senate: 34 of the 100 seats in the U.S. Senate are up for election and will be contested in in 2024.
 - As of January 2024, 21 Senators (14 Democrats, 6 Republicans, and 1 Independent) have announced their plans to run for re-election.
 - As of January 2024, 7 U.S. Senators are not seeking re-election in 2024 (5 Democrats, 2 Republicans).
 - Republicans are slightly favored to take control of the Senate in 2024.
