

Active Transportation Program: Overview

 State grant program aimed at increasing the share and safety of people walking, biking, and using other forms of active transportation

Administered by <u>California Transportation Commission</u>

• Cycle 7 ATP programs four years of funds: FY25/26 to FY28/29

Cycle 7 Active Transportation Program: Funding


- Nearly \$569M in funding
 - 50% Statewide
 - 10% to Small Urban & Rural
 - 40% to MPOs with 200,000+ population
- SCAG's MPO share: \$118M
 - Regional program competitively developed
 - Projects not funded in the statewide competition
 - Supplemental call for projects: Sustainable Communities Program

Cycle 7 Active Transportation Program: Eligible Applicants

- Local, regional or state agencies
 - o e.g. City, County, MPO
- Caltrans
 - Must show coordination with local agency
- Transit agencies
- Public schools or school districts
- Tribal governments
- Natural resource or public land agencies
 - o e.g. Local park agency
- Private non-profit managing recreational trails on public land

Cycle 7 Active Transportation Program: Project Types

- Infrastructure Projects: Capital projects (small, medium, & large)
- Non-infrastructure (NI) Projects: Education/encouragement programs
- Infrastructure projects with NI components: Capital projects with education/encouragement components



City of Los Angeles Western Our Way: Walk and Wheel Improvements ATP Cycle 6, Large Infrastructure Project, \$37.7M

Cycle 7 Active Transportation Program: Project Types

- Plans: Communitywide bicycle, pedestrian, safe routes, or active transportation plan
 - Must benefit disadvantaged community
- Quick-Build Projects: Interim capital infrastructure projects that are built with durable, low to moderate cost materials, and last from one year to five years
 - Applicants must meet with
 Commission staff by May 17, 2024

San Bernardino Valley Safe Routes to School Plan
(Unincorporated Schools)
ATP Cycle 6, Plan, \$500K

Cycle 7 Active Transportation Program: Timeline

- Statewide ATP call for projects: March 22 June 17, 2024
- Statewide ATP project selection: December 2024
- Regional ATP applications review: December 2024 February 2025
- Regional ATP draft recommended projects: April 2025
- Final Regional ATP projects: June 2025

Sustainable Communities Program

- Goal: provide resources and direct technical assistance to jurisdictions in support of *Connect SoCal* implementation
- Connect SoCal 2024 envisions a region that is:
 - Healthy improved public health
 - Prosperous inclusive and resilient economy
 - Accessible transportation is multimodal and accessible to all
 - Connected connected, livable, and vibrant communities

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Goals

- Improve mobility across the region
- Increase rates of walking and biking
- Advance traffic safety
- Expand opportunities for multimodal transportation options
- Competitively position local jurisdictions for implementation and grant funds

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Survey

Survey open March 6 – 22


- Goals:
 - Engage with stakeholders throughout entire process: guideline development to project selection
 - Provide early announcement of upcoming call for projects
 - Identify obstacles to submitting applications

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Survey Results

- 121 respondents from all six counties and representing various perspectives:
 - Community based organization and community member
 - Education/Research institution
 - Local agency staff: city, county, council of governments, transit agency
 - Tribal government
- 15 agencies/respondents applied to 2020 call for projects

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Survey Results

What type of project(s) would most benefit your community?



2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Survey Results

- Challenges and Recommendations
 - Streamline/Simplify application process given limited staff time and capacity to prepare applications
 - Share information early to give applicants time to prepare
 - Engage variety of stakeholders: planning, public works, grants, city managers, parks & recreation, and community members
 - Fund projects in a variety of contexts

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Call for Projects

Draft SCP-ATS Guidelines:

- Call for Projects: June 6 September 27, 2024
- Estimated \$10.4M to fund plans and quick build projects
 - Plans: No minimum, up to \$500K per plan
 - Quick Builds: No minimum, up to \$900K per quick build

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Eligible Applicants

- Local, regional or state agencies
 e.g. City, County, MPO
- Caltrans
 - Must show coordination with local agency
- Transit agencies
- Public schools or school districts
- Tribal governments
- Natural resource or public land agencies
 e.g. local park agency
- Private non-profit managing recreational trails on public land

Preparing for 2024 SCP-ATS Call for Projects

- Engage with community to identify priorities
- Identify champions
- Review guidelines and reach out to SCAG staff to discuss project ideas

2024 Sustainable Communities Program: Active Transportation & Safety Timeline

- Feedback on Draft Guidelines: April 4 26, 2024
- SCAG Regional Council adopts SCP-ATS guidelines: June 6, 2024
- Call for Projects: June 6 September 27, 2024
- Application Workshops: June 13 and June 27, 2024
- Project award announcement: June 2025

Quick Build Funding Opportunities: ATP Cycle 7

- Active Transportation Program Cycle 7
 - **Statewide** Call for Projects: March June 2024
 - Up to \$7M available for quick build projects (build and design/build)
 - Must participate in call with CTC staff prior to submission (<u>schedule by</u> May 17th)
 - **Regional** Component: January February 2025
 - Quick build projects not funded through Statewide Call for Projects will be considered
 - Sustainable Communities Program Call for Projects: June September 2024
 - \$7.515M for quick build projects throughout the region

What is a Quick Build?

- CA Transportation Commission: "interim capital improvement project"
- Near-term **pilot** project using durable, low to medium cost materials



Why Quick Builds?


- Strategy to respond to roadway safety issues relatively quickly
- Engage with community and gather feedback via pilot project
- Low-cost opportunity to test and iterate through project designs before committing to permanent project

Quick Build Elements

- Potential project elements:
 - Planter, parking, or plastic post protected bike lanes
 - Traffic circles:
 - Rubber curbs and plastic posts
 - Signage
 - Protected intersections:
 - Paint & posts curb extensions
 - Temporary refuges
 - Pavement markings
 - Temporary transit platforms
 - Interim **shared space** using barricades

Quick Build Process

Outreach/Design

•1-1.5 Years



Implementation

•Several days – couple months




Evaluation

•1 – 3 Years

When to use Quick Builds?

- Project that uses quick build materials
- Controversial or complex projects
 - Ongoing engagement to iterate through designs
- Locations with operational constraints
 - Test various designs for school loading
- Resurfacing/Repaving Program
 - Maximize funds and reduce construction impacts on community

Quick Build Example Scope

- Project Management
- Existing Conditions Analysis
 - o Mode share, transit ridership, counts, speeds, collisions
- Community Engagement
 - Community workshops, meetings, demonstration activity (Kit of Parts)
 - Community Advisory Committee & Technical Advisory Committee
- Quick Build Design
 - o Conceptual designs, signing & striping plans, and cost estimates
- Evaluation
 - o Mode share, transit ridership, counts, speeds, collisions, surveys
- Final Report
 - o Project summary, lessons learned, recommendations for next steps


Quick Build Example Design Process

Start with conceptual designs




Quick Build Example Design Process

Iterate on the design based on community and technical staff feedback




Quick Build Example Design Process

Finish with engineerstamped design ready for implementation Shatto Place Redesign Quick Build Project Iterative "Plan-storming"



Quick Build Project Budgets

- LADOT <u>Shatto Place Redesign</u>: \$250K
 - 1 block (600')
 - o Road diet and student valet zone
- Santa Monica <u>East Pico Safety Project</u>: \$800K
 - 0.6 mile
 - Curb extensions, high visibility crosswalks, and harden centerline/restrict turning movements
- Los Angeles County Lennox Vision Zero Traffic Safety Enhancements: \$1.14 M
 - o 16 intersections
 - Curb extensions, Leading Pedestrian Intervals, and high visibility crosswalks

Key Components to Develop a Quick Build Application

- Identify Project
 - Pull from existing plan and/or
 - o Gather input from community
- Form Project Team
 - Project Manager/Project Champion
 - o Key stakeholders (engineer to review designs, public works to implement, etc.)
- Establish partners
 - Letters of support/commitment











First Mile Last Mile Plan









FIGURE 4-5: Whittier Boulevard and Garfield Avenue Recommendations




FIGURE 4-7: Whittier Boulevard and Montebello Boulevard Recommendations







FIGURE 4-9: Washington Boulevard and Greenwood Avenue Recommendations




FIGURE 4-12: Sample Edge Lane Road markings and speed cushion



Go Human Program Background

- SCAG launched its community engagement and traffic safety program, *Go Human*, in 2015 to reduce traffic collisions and encourage people to walk and bike more.
- The campaign supports a regional transportation nexus through a coordinated strategy of neighborhood and community-level safety and engagement strategies.

2024 Go Human Community Streets Grant Program

- With support from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), SCAG has implemented five rounds of grant funding opportunities since 2018, distributing \$1.2 million+ to 117 projects.
- SCAG opened a sixth round of funding to local communities through the 2024 Go Human Community Streets Grant Program (Community Streets Program).



2024 Go Human Community Streets Grant Program Goals

• 2024 Go Human Community Streets Grant Program is a funding opportunity for community organizations to implement traffic safety and community engagement strategies.





- SCAG supports traffic safety campaigns by designing, printing, and shipping advertisements to local partners.
- Ads can be co-branded with partner logos and use pre-set or custom messages, in any language spoken in the region.




Co-branded Safety Messaging Materials

- Ad types include banners, lawn signs, digital ads, and more.
- Requests for co-branded materials are now open.
- Production on print material and media services will begin to be filled in Spring 2024.



Kit of Parts & Technical Assistance

- Engagement tool for jurisdictions to temporarily demonstrate safety infrastructure.
- Available to jurisdictions, agencies and community-based organizations year-round at no cost.
- SCAG will provide in-depth technical assistance for five (5) Kit of Parts deployments through September 2024.
- Resource: <u>Kit of Parts Playbook</u>



2023 SS4A Project Proposal and Budget

Action Plan Development

\$1 million

- Develop regional Action Plan, expanding SS4A eligibility for local jurisdictions.
- Coordinate regional SS4A awardees.

Go Human Safety Strategies

\$6 million

 Implement Go Human safety activities to support development of Action Plan, including Kit of Parts demonstrations, safety advertisements, CBO grants.

Sustainable Communities Program / Quick Builds

\$8 million

- Cost-effective demonstrations of safety infrastructure, repairing inequities.
- Leverages ATP funding.
- Call for Applications scheduled to open June 2024.

Total – \$15 million

SCP / Quick-Builds

- Ten (10) quick-build demonstrations selected through SCAG's Sustainable Communities Program.
- 18-month implementation.
- \$7.515 million available for planning and construction (includes \$3 million ATP funding)
- Timeline
 - Call Opens: June 2024
 - Project Selection: January February 2025
 - Implementation completed by December 2026

SCP / Quick-Builds

- Equity-centered prioritization methodology, with emphasis on repair of historic and current inequities. Additional considerations:
 - Project readiness
 - Alignment with communities most harmed by traffic injuries and fatalities
 - Opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships with local community organizations.
- SCAG will consider alignment with large scale events including 2026 World Cup and 2028 Olympics.

2024 SS4A NOFO

- Estimated \$188.5 million available for California (\$150 million in FY24 funds + FY23 carry over). Two grant options.
- olmplementation grants fund projects that address roadway safety problems. Applicants must have a qualifying Action Plan.
- Planning and Demonstration Grants can fund safety planning efforts and quick-build projects
