RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Recommend at least one (1) student each from Imperial, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, and Ventura Counties and at least two (2) students from Los Angeles County, to receive the 2024 SCAG Scholarship Program Award. The Scholarship Committee may, at their discretion (not compulsory), recommend a total of nine (9) students to receive a scholarship award. Apart from the seven (7) SCAG-funded awards, the California Transportation Foundation (CTF) will once again provide funding for two (2) additional scholarship awards. Recommendations will be forwarded to the Regional Council for approval at their next meeting on May 2, 2024.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 4: Provide innovative information and value-added services to enhance member agencies' planning and operations and promote regional collaboration.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The SCAG Scholarship Committee was formed by the Regional Council and SCAG President to evaluate submitted applications for the SCAG Scholarship Program, the purpose of which is to provide financial support to a select group of high school and community college students, particularly those interested in pursuing planning and/or public service-related careers. This year, SCAG received one hundred and fifteen (115) applications in total, and forty-four (44) of those have been forwarded to the Scholarship Committee for further evaluation.

BACKGROUND:

In July 2009, the Regional Council approved the SCAG Scholarship Pilot Program, which is intended to provide financial support to a select group of high school and community college students and offer local planning experience that students can use to develop their long-term career goals. Now in its fourteenth year, the program is open to high school seniors and community college students who reside in the six-county SCAG region. Students applying must have a minimum 3.0 grade point average and must be enrolled in higher education if graduating. As part of the application, students must submit a completed application form; a minimum 500-word essay describing their interests in urban planning and public policy; two (2) letters of recommendation; and a current transcript of records.





In addition to a monetary award of \$4,000, awardees may be invited to attend and be recognized during a Regional Council meeting. Students may also work with SCAG staff to pursue an internship with local government agencies, based on availability.

Applications for the SCAG Scholarship Program were due electronically by Friday, March 22, 2024. SCAG received a total of one hundred and fifteen (115) applications from throughout the SCAG region. There were twenty-four (24) from Imperial County, fifty-one (51) from Los Angeles County, eight (8) from Orange County, ten (10) from Riverside County, nine (9) from San Bernardino County, and thirteen (13) from Ventura County. Applications were screened based on the minimum requirements and the interests described in the essay portion. Although many of the applicants met the minimum requirements, primarily those students who exhibited some interest in planning, public policy, public service, and/or government were selected to be forwarded to the Scholarship Committee. Applicants who did not submit the required application materials were sent a courtesy email to submit the missing item(s) by the deadline.

Staff has forwarded forty-four (44) applications, consisting of nine (9) from Imperial County, eighteen (18) from Los Angeles County, three (3) from Orange County, five (5) from Riverside County, four (4) from San Bernardino County, and five (5) from Ventura County to the Scholarship Committee for further evaluation. The Scholarship Committee has been asked to evaluate the applications and recommend at least one (1) student each from Imperial, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino Counties and at least two (2) students from Los Angeles County, to receive the 2024 SCAG Scholarship Program Award. The Scholarship Committee may, at their discretion (not compulsory), recommend a total of nine (9) students to receive a scholarship award. Apart from the seven (7) SCAG-funded awards, the California Transportation Foundation will once again provide funding for two (2) additional scholarship awards. The California Transportation Foundation was founded in 1988 to create a charity that would support the Caltrans community and later expanded to serve the private sector and other public transportation agency employees as well. Recommendations will be forwarded to the Regional Council for approval at their next meeting on May 2, 2024.

It is suggested that the Scholarship Committee consider the interests of the students in their respective essays, career goals, and activities in each student's school and surrounding community when evaluating the applications. Names and other personal identifiers have been removed from the applications, essays, letters of recommendation, transcripts, and other supporting documents to protect the privacy of the students, and each forwarded application has been assigned a number for reference. In following the practice from prior years, the selection of recommended finalists will be via Committee consensus.



In addition to redacted applications, the attachments below include a ranking sheet Members may choose to use as they review applications.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The SCAG Scholarship Program cost would be a minimum of \$28,000 for seven (7) scholarship awards, or a maximum of \$36,000 if two (2) additional scholarships are awarded. Funds are included in the FY 2023-2024 General Fund Budget in Project Number 800-0160.29.


SCAG Scholarship Essay

SCAG Scholarship

I love the smell of manure. Not the smell itself per say, but what it reminds me of. Where others smell cow waste, I smell recess with my friends, playing in our elementary school alongside a feedlot. I smell drives to school in a pickup truck, trading baseball cards and watching the fields as we pass by. My valley's largest export is cattle, so I grew up with the smell hanging in the air in the early spring mornings. To me, manure is the smell of home.

I've spent my whole life in a small community in Southern California called the Imperial Valley. In the middle of a miserably hot desert, there's my hometown: a vibrant, agricultural community that combines European and Mexican cultures. When I say we are agricultural, I mean it. Our whole world revolves around agriculture. My dad is a farmer, so one of my earliest memories is of riding in a tractor with him. I've raised goats and cared for just about every type of livestock imaginable. This was the backdrop of my life.

As I've matured, I've come to realize the flaws of my community. I've been inspired by medicine and science for as long as I can remember, and in a small, impoverished area, I lacked the STEM opportunities I would only hear about from nearby San Diego or Los Angeles. Any opportunities at home were agriculture-focused. I remember wishing every year that my school would have a science fair, but they simply couldn't, due to lack of funding. I remember quietly hoping my family would move to my dad's hometown in rural Iowa. *At least they have science fairs*, I would think to myself. Since the ripe age of twelve, my main goal was to go to a college

far, far away from home and never look back. Not because I hated the valley, but because I felt like I would never be able to pursue my dreams there.

Then, the COVID-19 pandemic hit. I was just thirteen and watching my community crumble on its foundations. Our hospitals were so overcrowded with both US citizens and people from Mexico seeking decent healthcare that our community college gymnasium was full of COVID-positive patients, waiting on care. I watched one of our two hospitals work itself further and further into debt, eventually being forced to shut down its obstetrics and pediatrics departments, which has had detrimental effects on Imperial Valley residents and mothers from the nearby Mexican border cities, such as Mexicali. I felt completely and utterly helpless, watching loved ones in healthcare being worked to a thread and hearing about unprecedented understaffing. As much as I had wanted to leave the Imperial Valley, there was nothing I wanted to do more in that moment than to save it.

Despite being the worst affected county in California, we had a severe lack of doctors. The ratio of healthcare providers to patients was over four times the statewide average, not including the added stress of patients from Mexico, who were desperate for care. Our state government ignored us, which only fuelled the fire under me. I had a new goal.

Since the pandemic, I've been interested in providing medicine in underserved communities in crisis, like my own. Growing up in a close-knit community with limited resources has allowed me to recognize unique challenges that such communities face. I want to dedicate my life to serving those who do not have access to healthcare or other resources. I want to get a medical degree so I can staff those hospitals others are unable or unwilling to staff. I want to spend my life giving back to my community and to communities around the world just

like my own. However flawed the Imperial Valley may be, this valley has made me who I am today and has inspired me to live a life of service and compassion.







Living in a farm-working community, the chances that students are accepted into higher education are low. Nevertheless, I want to become a chemical engineer after high school, study for a Bachelor's degree, and pursue a Master's degree after my B.A. To achieve this goal, I have taken 12 AP classes related to math and science, taking 3 dual enrollments, and 2 concurrent enrollments throughout my high school years.

My passion for being in the science field has always been a goal of mine. When taking AP Environmental Science in the summer of my sophomore year, I was highly interested in wanting to know about how chemistry affects our environment. That is when I joined the Youth Environmental Health Internship, where my determination took us to speak on behalf of our community in Washington, D.C. This experience played a big part in my wish to study Chemical Engineering. As part of a collaborative project, we studied the impact of chemical compounds on pollution in the community. As a way for us to experience how our data gets analyzed, we were taken to a science laboratory at San Diego State University. I was astonished as I walked into the halls of the laboratory for the first time. All I could see was all the foreign equipment I had only seen in videos. My thoughts began to unravel with questions about how they were used and what I could do with them. Being there, I affirmed confidently and determined: "I am going to be in one of these laboratories in the future."

Also, I am aware of how this will impact our environment as well as generate clean energy, an important factor in producing a sustainable society. This project inspires me to look for higher education, aiming to come back with the knowledge and experience to positively impact my community. My main goal is to become a socially responsible engineer who can contribute to the growth of this project and benefit the community's well-being.

Although being a woman in the STEM field is competitive and male-dominated, it doesn't scare me because I have the determination and discipline to thrive in this field. By participating in MANA de Imperial Valley, and as a member of the school's Women Empowerment Club, I learned the skills to help me adapt to any environment. It gave me the power to motivate other women to be self-confident, promote equality, and advocate for women's involvement in STEM careers by engaging in college preparation workshops.

Being part of these communities has helped me become empathetic with others, establish meaningful relationships, effectively communicate with others, and work as a team to achieve our goals. Being certified as a lifeguard and being part of the varsity swimming team, make me

feel confident and proud of myself when I empathize with my teammates and validate their emotions to create a safe and productive environment. It allows me to build a strong character, and become a well-rounded student.

Receiving this scholarship will not only help me with my college tuition but will also allow me to focus more on my education rather than worry about how I will pay for my expenses. I'm ready to pursue my higher education dream and strive to be part of the next generation of female engineers. I hope to serve as an inspiration for other young girls with the same curiosity. Because when we empower women, we empower the rest of the community. Chemistry is my passion, and I want to turn this passion into my dream. I have learned to be prepared for every advantage presented to me, and use it to enhance my chances of growing. I have strengthened my analytical thinking skills in challenging problems where it seems to not have a solution. Furthermore, I'm not afraid to fail, to evolve, or to take risks, and I will be an accomplished scientist, so I can come back to the Imperial Valley and positively contribute to the world.





A dark curtain was eerily creeping up the hillside. As my family and I evacuated our home, the scene was reminiscent of a warzone with fireplanes flying overhead into rising smoke plumes. The Woolsey Fire destroyed 67 local homes and scorched 21,000 acres of the beautiful Santa Monica Mountains. All this destruction ignited a passionate fire in me to fight Climate Change. I was determined to make a difference.

I applied to be a member of the City of Calabasas Mayor's Youth Council and was one of eight students selected. After expressing my ambitious environmental goals to the Mayor and City Council, I was elected Vice President of the council and leader of its Environmental Subcommittee. I organized and supervised the Arbor Day Tree Replacement event, Earth Day Festival, and countless creek cleanups. I also created a public touring program for the Las Virgenes Municipal Water District, so residents could learn about new cutting-edge technology that could mitigate the seemingly everlasting drought.

Furthering my efforts to rebuild the greenery in Calabasas after the Woolsey fire's destruction, I set out to create a community gardening program. This would further connect my city to environmental activism while sustainably growing produce that could be donated to local food banks. I arranged a meeting with my School District Board and explained all the details, including the budget needed for the garden (\$10,000) and the location utilizing open-burn space, remnants of the fire. I was thrilled when the board was impressed by my pitch and agreed to support me. After several months of leading a construction team, it was complete. Now, residents help tend the gardens, and the produce is delivered to local food banks. This project has been so successful that more gardens are in the works.

Impressed by these accomplishments, Mayoral Candidate Rick Caruso invited members of my committee to tour a new restaurant in his local center, Lala Land Kind Cafe, to learn about their sustainable practices. Unfortunately, I knew that only a short distance away, people dealt with severe homelessness without the luxury of food from an eccentric cafe. I had to fight this inequity. I decided to collaborate with Rick Caruso's management team to create a leftover food program that partnered with his restaurants. I offered to gather leftover food at the end of the day and donate it to local food banks and homeless shelters. I was thrilled that this program was approved by the Caruso Team, so I could help supply the homeless, while also minimizing food waste, further aiding my community's sustainability efforts. My program is now supported by 11 local restaurants and dozens of volunteers who have contributed to the hundreds of meals we deliver weekly.

Amazed by my connection to the community, the Caruso Team reached out to me to speak on behalf of my peers, regarding plans to sustainably develop affordable housing and green space. I addressed the City Council and over one hundred residents during a televised meeting. Ultimately, my efforts helped earn a unanimous vote in support of the project.

The Environmental Commission of the City of Calabasas was so impressed by my dedication to environmental causes that the entire Commission voted to elect me as the Student Environmental Commissioner for the city. Recently, I have had the privilege of being the youngest recipient of the City of Calabasas Citizen of the Year Award from our Mayor during his State of the City Address. This honor recognizes my dedication to community service and continued passion for civic engagement and sustainability.

During future events, I was fortunate enough to meet impactful political figures like California Congresswoman Julia Brownley to discuss initiatives for our area. I followed up our meeting by researching her platform and studying her environmental legislation like the Zero Food Waste Act and her additions to the Clean Air Act. I reached out to her campaign team and shared my past accomplishments and passion for her work. Impressed, Congresswoman Brownley offered me an internship position in her campaign.

Some of my tasks included door-to-door canvassing, managing social media, and voter outreach efforts. I witnessed the importance of understanding a community's diverse perspectives and the need to be open to change as Congresswoman Brownley's campaign adapted to the political landscape. Her motivation to fight for what will help her constituents and her ability to do so through national efforts inspired me to follow in her footsteps as I look to immerse myself in the world of public policy as an undergraduate. Through my studies and new experiences, I am hopeful that I will be able to influence change on a larger scale by making my solutions for sustainability and other pressing issues a reality.

Ultimately, the Woolsey Fire compelled me to collaborate with community leaders and develop my leadership skills while creating sustainable, environmental programs. The passion I developed through my efforts to help rebuild my city has translated into other aspects of my life, and now I am eager to enhance my impact as an undergraduate studying public policy and continue to make a change in my new communities.



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The USC Physician Assistant Pathways program has been instrumental in developing my personal, professional, and social-emotional growth. It has given me extensive medical knowledge and opened up various opportunities. I have participated and attended the program on the weekends for ten years; I have transformed from a participant into part of the leadership team, eager to assist participants in their journeys. Driven by the experiences and growth I have gained, I aim to become a direct patient care provider as a Physician Assistant.

My involvement and commitment to the Pathways program have led to life-changing experiences that have given me new perspectives and opened doors to exciting new opportunities. I had the chance to shadow physicians at USC Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center's Department of Radiation Oncology. This highly selective summer internship and our team's dedication led to a 10% improvement in patient satisfaction rates. As part of the shadowing opportunity, I followed patients' treatment plans, assisted in patient examination and transportation, observed operating room procedures, and learned alongside residents.

One of the social injustices that I have observed through this internship is the lack of communication between patients and physicians due to the language barrier. As a member of a Spanish-speaking family, a first-generation household, I have personally experienced this issue with my grandmother and her doctors. I was able to connect with patients and understand the uncertainty and discomfort that come with not understanding illnesses due to the language barrier. Therefore, I created guidance pamphlets for Spanish-speaking patients, helping both the community and an institution that faced a language barrier, explaining to them the steps of their treatment plan in the hopes that they would understand their treatment plan.

Additionally, I had the opportunity to serve my community during the pandemic. The City of Los Angeles's eastside community of Boyle Heights was the epicenter for coronavirus infections and mortality rates in the country. I helped launch the first food distribution, testing, and vaccination sites at the East LA Weingart YMCA in Boyle Heights. In addition, we were serving the neighboring communities of El Sereno, Lincoln Heights, and East Los Angeles County. I witnessed how the communities lacked access to nutritious, affordable food and essential items. I formed part of a team that served over 500-800 families weekly, providing fresh produce, hygiene products, and warm meals. We also offered clean clothes, warm meals, and showers to unsheltered individuals weekly. As a result of my commitment during the COVID-19 pandemic's peak, Mayor Eric Garcetti recognized me as a leader in workforce development for community response with the YMCA and the University of Southern California. But most importantly, I learned that my response must go beyond addressing community needs.

My community engagement experiences allow me to be at the forefront and witness the Social Determinants of Health. By pursuing a higher education, I aim to serve vulnerable

communities by providing resources, education, and services to gain quality and equitable access to healthcare and beyond. I aspire to maximize all resources offered by the college I attend to become an integral part of the communities, promoting health and well-being. My ambition is to be at the forefront of leadership in the medical field.

Maximizing my college experience is of utmost importance to me. Having already experienced attending a high school outside of my residency area, I have gained valuable skills in adapting to different environments. This experience has allowed me to immerse myself in the Boyle Heights community, where I currently attend school, by actively participating in volunteer services during the challenging times of the pandemic as a volunteer at the Weingert YMCA food distribution. As I look forward to my college journey, I aspire to replicate this involvement and similarly contribute to the community. Irrespective of the institution I choose to attend, I am determined to engage in a pre-med program and sign up for various internships that will serve as a guiding force throughout my college life.

In addition to my commitment to community engagement, I am eager to establish strong connections both within the surrounding community and within my college community through volunteer work. By actively participating in volunteer services, I aim to become deeply rooted in the fabric of the community, fostering meaningful relationships and making a positive impact. Furthermore, I am considering the possibility of joining a pre-med program during my college years. This program would not only provide me with valuable guidance but also align my goals with the path toward graduate school. I am a world-class receptionist.

This past summer I interned at Congressman Sherman's District Office. I worked as a 9-to-5 receptionist spending my mornings transcribing dozens of voicemails, fixing computers, and mastering the ways of Excel spreadsheets. However, I had no idea that once entrusted with answering phones, I would be thrust into the middle of constituents' crises.

Throughout my internship, I connected with all sorts of people, representing their cases to an array of federal agencies and resolving dozens of cases. I made sure Nancy understood her Medicare benefits, Robert received his passport, and Becky was refunded her IRS payment. At the end of the summer, I reflected on my experiences working in the office but also previous years of local government service. Volunteering for Mayor David Shapiro, I lead the Mayor's Youth Council, engaged youth with local government, and organized dozens of community events. Additionally, as a student commissioner for the Calabasas Public Safety Commission, I witnessed how municipal governments prepare for emergencies and raised awareness about drunk driving and the fentanyl epidemic. First hand, I saw and contributed to the way the government affected individual's lives and realized, in some way, this is what I wanted to dedicate my career to.

Later, when I undertook a research project, I was able to synergize my interest in government with my passions for history and statistics. My research project started off by listening to my Babushka describe families she knew who had escaped the current war in Ukraine and then decide to return. I was intrigued. Why would current refugees, having arrived in a safe country, choose to go back to a war zone? Naturally, I began an investigation.

To understand refugee motives, I applied a methodology I learned from statistics: survey research. I formulated questions about family dynamics, economic considerations, and cultural ties. With the help of Professor Kudyma, a senior lecturer at the UCLA Slavic Department, and Professor Lylo, a Ukrainian visiting professor at UCSD, I translated my survey into Russian and Ukrainian. I also partnered with Razom, a nonprofit aiding Ukrainians, to survey 52 refugees, and created data models to visualize connections among data sets. My investigation revealed to me that nearly forty percent of refugees wanted to return to Ukraine, all citing reasons due to bureaucratic failures. I took and published my findings in the Student Journal of Research, where I was able to draw light onto the results of policies that were forcing huge groups of refugees to leave. Beyond answering my initial question, this research experience helped me understand that my affinity to government and my interests in humanities and mathematics converge in a policymaking career.

As I look to begin my career, I can't think of a better place than the Joint Program between Columbia University in the City of New York and the Jewish Theological Seminary to prepare

me for a career in public service. Already accepted Early Decision and committed to the Joint Program, I plan to major in Political Science and Jewish History.

By combining the two distinct fields, I aim to explore justice from complementary perspectives. For example, I'd like to compare Tolstoy and Dostoevsky's view of human nature and morality with the Talmud's ideas of authority and righteousness. This training, in seeing complex issues from multiple perspectives, will give me the empathy needed to become an effective policymaker.

Pursuing my Political Science degree, I plan to take both Literature Humanities and Contemporary Civilization. I want to read Thucydides, Machiavelli, and Locke to educate me in various theories of government. By completing my Jewish History major, I will take electives in Ethics and Philosophy to hone my skills in ethical reasoning and philosophical exploration. 

An awful shriek came from the kitchen, followed by cries that continue to haunt me today. I ran to find my mother, depleted by her emotions. A few hours later, my Guatemalan relatives arrived with the same diminished expressions. My father eventually broke the news: Brandon, my cousin, was murdered in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala.

Brandon was a few years older than me, I met him through my visit to Quetzaltenango and our WhatsApp calls. A soccer fanatic and humorous character, his fate revealed to me the unconventionality and unpredictability of life. We had a lot in common, coming from working-class families and crime-associated communities; I reflected on our conversations and dreams in life.

Before his death, I wasn't passionate about social change or activism. His death marked the beginning of a new chapter for me to take on a responsibility. I established this set of principles to commemorate Brandon, a Constitution for my actions:

Article I: I will accomplish Brandon's dreams, and his death shall not be vain.

Article II: I will advocate for immigrant rights as much as possible.

Article III: I will bring positive change to my and Brandon's communities.

Beginning with Article I, Brandon's dream was to attain U.S. citizenship and to take on real opportunities. I, in contrast, already had the privileges he desired, so I advanced on them. I enrolled in demanding AP courses, college courses, and the Pathways to Health Careers Academy by Charles Drew University. Through PHCA, I was introduced to policymaking, intrigued by the mechanisms behind making laws to save people from undesirable fates.

I began to achieve Articles II and III when I partook in a Youth Participatory Research Project and researched how low-income, mixed-status families dealt with rising rent costs in South Los Angeles. After months of data collection, I presented the discoveries to advocacy organizations that were pushing the city for reform. I felt accomplished, but I continued to embrace my constitution, from interning at the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights to working to reallocate school police funding with the ACLU Youth Liberty Squad. I hadn't planned on it, but I later adopted a new Article:

Article IV: I will become a Legislator and push for impactful policies.

As I stepped onto the Assembly floor in the Sacramento Capitol through the Chicano Latino Youth Leadership Project, I manifested my future as a legislator. I envisioned myself on the microphone speaking with pride about where I had come from. With my Constitution as the core motivation, I will speak on behalf of millions so our difficulties are recognized. Brandon's death will be a part of who I am as I rise in politics. Violence haunts my community and my family, from Central America to South Central LA, but the fear fuels a desire to act. As I continue to mark my history, Article II is only beginning, and I long to return to Quetzaltenango, with the strength of Article IV, bring this world to justice; in other words, Matthew's retaliation.

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





I am one of urban planning's biggest fans. I ride a bike to school almost every day, I watch urban planning videos, I talk to my friends about urban planning, I make presentations about urban planning, and I even write speeches about urban planning.

For the past two years, I have ridden my bike to school almost every day to reduce my carbon footprint. I know that being the change you wish to see in the world is the only way real change will occur. Furthermore, I believe that walkable and bikeable cities increase a community's standard of living, so I also bike to prove that we don't need automobiles to get everywhere. Simply discussing issues is not enough—we must take action to solve modern problems.

One of the largest problems plaguing not just my community but communities all across America is that of sustainable development. There are cleaner alternatives to automobiles such as trains, bikes, and subways. Of course, there may be other alternatives we haven't invented yet. With my STEM education, I hope to improve these systems that allow everyday citizens to move about their city easily. Furthermore, better sustainable forms of transportation will help reduce climate change. More walkable cities also contribute to better health outcomes and greater happiness. Reducing our reliance on the automobile would reduce the deaths due to vehicle crashes, which is the leading cause of death for Americans aged 5-29.

I have personally taken Amtrak rail from Los Angeles to Lafayette a multitude of times. The experience was much better than flying, given the space we had to move around and how we got to explore the cities of each station we stopped at. Unfortunately taking the train in this manner has become too expensive, and we now take a plane to reach Louisiana (and come back).

Like any other urban planning enthusiast, I love trains, and I think America could stand to gain significantly from replicating the European model of rail transportation.

In addition to my passion for urban planning, I aspire to work at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, back where it all started. NASA is counting on the best engineers to expand our knowledge of space. I hope that my future work will help humanity, whether that be pioneering new technology with broad applications or beginning humanity's space era.

Being in Speech and Debate, I have debated more than my fair share of urban planning and public policy topics. I've written congressional bills, including one to eliminate single-family zoning throughout the United States and another to establish a 32-hour workweek (before Bernie Sanders recently spearheaded the latter issue). Every bill I debate in my Congressional Competitions is public policy, like reforming road specification laws, raising the driving age, establishing a universal basic income, as well as foreign policy like creating a military base in Taiwan or establishing normal relations with Cuba. I have also competed in Extemporaneous Speech and Parliamentary Debate, where I receive a topic either 30 or 20 minutes before it's time to compete. I keep up with the news, since I never know which headline I'll have to debate, but also because I want to be an informed citizen. I consider myself to be one of the most politically informed students at my school, given how often I keep up with the news and the great extent to which I research the effects of implementation of certain policies, even writing my own bills.

I struggle to find others as passionate about urban planning and public policy as myself. I have made myself knowledgeable of the subject of urban planning and public policy, and I hope to have a role in influencing it in the future. I have been involved with urban planning and public

policy through my Speech and Debate competitions. I know that our transportation system and public policy can be better, and I wish to strive to make that change.







At 14, I had an environmental epiphany that completely changed my world. I was watching a show called "Raven's Home", on the Disney Channel, and my everyday habits were forever altered because of the protagonist, Nia Baxter. She exposed me to the climate crisis by pointing out the harm done to the environment through excessive meat consumption and plastic use. Since then, not only have I removed meat from my diet and no longer used single-use plastic beverage bottles, but my passion for studying environmental science was born.

My perception of everything around me was altered. The things that I saw as normal were now saddening. Before my revelation, I was oblivious to all those Decembers in Mexico when I saw my family burn their trash, whether it was a pizza box or a plastic bag. When I visited, it pained me to see my grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins throw their trash into the fire. I noticed that they mixed their trash with unused parts of fruits and vegetables. My continuous harping on their poor environmental behavior has led them to adopt a system for upcycling their waste: composting. Since my grandparents' house was a haven for all my relatives, all those food scraps could have been used to improve their terrain. I found a wooden crate and put it next to my grandma's sink. I explained to her that she could place any food scraps into the crate for composting. The first time the crate was full, I took it from the house and carried it across the street to my grandparents' land. Having family live close by, I took this opportunity to teach my cousins how to trench compost. We dug our first trench together. Ever since then, my family has taken the crates across the street and enriched the soil of my grandparents' crops. Now, when I visit, trench composting is part of their daily routine. Most recently, my grandfather won the contest for the largest corn in town, attributing this prize to my teachings on composting. Even in my immediate family, when I stopped eating meat my family did the same. I've also taught my family to compost and I urge my family to eat more home-cooked meals rather than takeout which incurs excessive packaging. I get such satisfaction even when making small environmental improvements.

The summer between 10th and 11th grade, I worked with the Constitutional Research Foundation and researched the cause of wildfires to create a public service announcement to share with the Los Angeles community that talked about the prevention of human-induced fires. We used TikTok and Instagram as the social media tools to get the message out to the public about how to properly extinguish campfires.

Since the beginning of 10th grade, I joined the high school Chance club that advocates for environmental preservation. Every Friday I take part in campus cleanups where I collect trash around the entire school and sort the recyclables from the disposables. The recyclables are sold, and the money from that month is donated to a non-profit organization that fights climate change. I continuously do my best to be an advocate for the environment. To further my environmental education, I am taking AP Environmental Science and loving it.

Through my work in high school and the small changes I've made within my family, both in Los Angeles and Mexico, I realize that there is so much more that I can do to influence and teach my family and my community. I want to be able to educate them and invent solutions to tackle environmental issues. In this capacity, I'm eager to be an environmental science major and ultimately pursue an advanced degree in environmental policy. With the research and experience I'd receive while getting my master's, I'd want to work for the United States Environmental Policy Agency (EPA) afterward. This would be an ideal job for me because it involves public policy and will help tackle climate change. Moreover, I would be able to govern the sustainability practices of businesses and make them accountable for their actions.

I'm grateful to Nia for educating and influencing me. Thanks to her, I was able to break old habits and ways of thinking and become someone who is environmentally conscious.



I still picture my 14-year-old eyes mesmerized by the red and blue dripping off my TV screen. They had done it again, in every corner of this country both Democrats and Republicans ripped apart the people's representation through gerrymandering. Arkansas was the first to fall, I remember watching as lawmakers brutalized the city of Little Rock into 3 congressional districts, effectively neutralizing the abilities of Democratic and Black voters in the state to elect a candidate of their choice.

My quarantine-ridden curiosity had piqued, and I was captivated by the idea of being able to replicate those maps myself. While most had a Covid hobby like baking or playing board games, I set out on my own frivolous quest and designed over 2,600 congressional and state legislative maps to discover the extent of my creativity. The possibilities in my mind were endless among the 50 states with which to work. I remember sitting at my computer until 3 AM, slicing apart every city I could get my hands on: Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee, Miami, no city was safe. The concept of having power over politics in this country was fun to me, no matter how imaginary it may have been. Through this process one key thing still perplexed me, the fact that a 14-year-old on a laptop at three in the morning could create better maps than lawmakers with millions of dollars at their disposal.

Simultaneously, I dived into the depths of what is known as election Twitter, my feed constantly being flooded by half-thought and stale political takes revolving around the upcoming midterm elections, but also by some who wanted to spread their creative mapmaking like me. Even though I didn't have the large following many sought, I was still satisfied to share my projects with the platform even if just one person took an interest in them. The singular like or interaction with my account was enough for me to be happy that my creativity and interests were at least being acknowledged by the outside world and not something kept in the dungeon of my thoughts. I always enjoyed the puzzled faces I would get when I said I like to draw maps in my free time, over something like playing video games or sports. But that was the beauty, it didn't have to make sense to them and I could care less if it did. It was just me, myself, and I in my own political world, no one at my school was interested in politics and my parents were often disinterested

But for me, isolation has always brought the most memorable experiences because they appear in a way only I can understand. At face value, Covid was a low point in my relatively short existence. Lazily staring at the ceiling all day is not what many would call a useful lifestyle, so I'm glad the political turmoil behind the 2020 election and the subsequent redistricting cycle within it sparked the political interest that I hold so near and dear to my heart today. 





To eighth-grade me, politics meant nothing but articles and statistics to support an argument in a debate. Cable news presented politics as a sports game—root for the team you like and unleash vitriol against those you didn't fall into the same political label. However, a quick turn of events—the Bobcat Fire—changed the dynamic of my outlook on public service. Instead of using partisan rhetoric to fight the crisis looming a mile from our homes, my mayor, April Verlato, was a voice of reason who personally updated me and my neighbors on the fire's progression and provided constant communication with the fire department. From this experience, I learned the significance of being a servant leader: that being well-informed and driven to improve one's community is the catalyst to affecting positive change.

From then on, I applied myself to learning every facet of Arcadia and the moving parts that entailed a responsive, functioning government that served our needs. I would consistently be the youngest student to deliver public comments on public safety or sit in on community forums regarding homelessness. As I transitioned to high school in La Cañada, the interconnectedness of our cities became clear to me—each city's leaders were entrusted to navigate through the same issues I had learned about in my hometown. Another common denominator was that in each conversation I had, the elected officials, who over time became my mentors and friends, emphasized the importance of their mandate to serve the people and advocate for their interests by creating policies that would deliver a net benefit to their city. Regardless of the national partisan climate, local government was where I saw leaders come together to create sustainable solutions to the pressing issues that they faced. I have embraced this spirit of coalition-building and goal-oriented advocacy, which has led to my work as the youngest member of BizFed and working on bipartisan campaigns and initiatives for public safety reform and fiscal policy.

As I prepare to leave California for UPenn, there are many issues that I will leave unsolved. While the reality is that many of these—homelessness, cost of living, and affordable housing—are generational matters, I am proud of the impact I've made in working with our small and medium-sized cities and look forward to pursuing an education that would allow me to return and build upon my work. The next generation of California stands at a crossroads, which hinges on affordability and the availability of new opportunities. My goal after I complete my education will be to build public-private partnerships, as I am doing now with my various civic projects, to improve zoning and land use laws so we can feasibly accomplish inclusive and sustainable housing plans that allow for my generation to enjoy this state's blessings. I am grateful for the opportunity to contribute to SCAG's mission of fostering sustainable growth and prosperity, and I look forward to the opportunity to further my education and professional development through the SCAG Scholarship program.

How I've Connected with Public Service

If I was asked to pinpoint when I developed an interest in public service, I wouldn't be able to answer. It's always felt like something that's been a part of who I was. I remember being a little kid and pretending I was a secret agent who was on her way to save the world from certain doom and destruction. As I grew older I came to understand that the world did not need to be saved by super secret agents with otherworldly powers. When it came time for me to start thinking about what I wanted to study and pursue as a career, I considered many different careers. I considered everything from medical school to engineering, but the one thing I held myself back from was law enforcement. I guess I was afraid that my family wouldn't think it was a good idea, or they might think I'm too soft to go into a field like that. Or maybe I thought I wouldn't be able to do it. But I came to realize that my decision shouldn't come from other people's opinions of what is good for me. I also understood that I would never know if I could do it if I didn't try. So I decided that I would do it. I would study in a public service field, criminology, and I would work for the safety of the American people. What I learned over the time I researched was that there is so much that goes into solving a case. In my junior year of high school, I took a class on GIS. I had no idea what I would learn or what GIS even stood for. But as the year progressed and I slowly learned what GIS was and how to use it (and that it stood for Geographical Information System), I came to see that it's incredibly important to public service in many ways. For example, one thing I learned in GIS is how to use the data to create a map in a way that is easily interpreted. When faced with problems while completing tutorials on

ArcGIS (a GIS platform), my team and I worked together to figure out the best way to troubleshoot. In that class we also had the opportunity to select a course provided by ArcGIS in order to expand our skills. I chose to do the Spatial Analysis course, and throughout that course I learned many different things that can be applied to a career in public service. Spatial analysis allows us to calculate distances, both between data and within a data frame. It also allows us to see which layers of data overlap with one another. I thought this skill would be especially useful because we can use crime data to see where crime overlaps with other factors, for example, income.

I see public service jobs as a way to help people, not to save the world from certain doom and destruction. I want to use my job as a way to protect the country that has given me so many opportunities. Growing up a daughter of immigrants, I saw how difficult it was for my parents. Living here, experiencing a comfortable life while hearing stories from my family members about their life in Iran and how difficult it became after the Iranian Revolution, I came to understand how important it was for me to make sure that life here was safe and easy for all citizens. I feel a sense of pride in knowing that I can be a part of the solution and fight for the safety of all American citizens.







Using my experiences to inspire others not only helps them unlock their potential but also fills me with a sense of energy and purpose. Inspired by my own experiences as an immigrant, I am committed to using my abilities to support others who may find themselves in similar situations.





In the summer of 2023, I had the privilege to participate in the LEAP Foundation Program. This competitive summer program hosted at UCLA consisted of an entrepreneurship and motivational program for high school-aged students. A panel of over 300 students was informed on the challenges entrepreneurs and celebrities encountered to succeed.

After receiving an acceptance letter from this prestigious program, I began to doubt my academic potential. As a first-generation student, I felt undeserving of taking up educational spaces like the LEAP Foundation Program. I was in a brainwashed space, where I believed that first generations weren't capable of pursuing higher education because historically, educational institutions exclude individuals who share similar characteristics as me. Navigating a college education with a reluctant mindset was bound to close all potential opportunities for myself. I realized that the spaces I believed that I deserved were defined by stereotypes. To overcome these stereotypes, I chose to participate.

By attending this program, I participated in workshops organized by business leaders and entrepreneurs. One workshop in particular was "Learning how to love yourself" hosted by social media influencer Ohavia Phillips. I learned that nothing in life is possible without loving myself first. Without the idea of self-love, I was bound to believe that I was undeserving of my academic achievements. Through a fixed mindset, I could believe in myself enough to feel that I did work hard enough to earn success. This confidence taught me whether opportunities work out or not, is still a lesson for self-growth. The habit of positive self-talk and encouraging affirmations are crucial to my higher education. I realized that my academics are a reflection of my true potential, so now I begin to take every opportunity with a sense of gratitude and confidence. A confidence that will guide me to building networks and connections to further succeed in my academics. As a first-generation student, I now perceive education as a chance to break away from the stereotypes I once faced. These are the exact stereotypes that no longer continue to determine whether I accept or decline an opportunity.

Furthermore, my experiences of being an underrepresented member within my local community sparked the idea that I could shift my mindset and promote opportunities and justice within my community. Participating in Ohavia Phillips' workshop sparked an inner motivation to continue fighting for my local community. As a witness to the injustices faced within my community, it inspired me to work towards encouraging and advocating for the rights of local tenants within Highland Park Northeast Los Angeles. I knew that if I could continue growing as a person with multiple opportunities to do so, my community would come alongside me and continue to flourish with equal opportunities. Despite the hardships I have encountered throughout my life, my community always offered their support, hugging me when I needed someone most.


In recent years, I witnessed my community get evicted and struggle to pay rent due to gentrification in Highland Park Northeast Los Angeles. Homes are being replaced by enterprises

or the construction of newer unaffordable homes, which evicts and increases residents' living costs. As a witness to this form of displacement, I have seen long-time residents leave the places referred to as their "home". These residents are often left with financial burdens and begin to sleep in their cars due to a lack of government support.

To address this growing problem, I participated in the Audubon Youth Leaders program in Debs Park. This program educates youth through advocacy work and hands-on experience by protecting native plants and advocating for bill acts. I and interns advocated for the Affordable Care Act 14 Homelessness and Affordable Housing bills. These bills allow unhoused residents in California to get into safer and affordable housing. The funding also provided services to prevent and end homelessness.

To promote these bills, I and interns sent letters to my Assemblymember, Wendy Carillo. Through these letters, I discussed how these bills would get hundreds of residents into safer and affordable housing. I sent out handwritten letters to guarantee that Wendy Carillo and her team read the concerns of the community. Through these initiatives, I had the opportunity to speak with her field representative to advocate and understand the measures taken to address the housing crisis.

From this experience, I gained the significance of community involvement within local government, in which all power lies within the people. A large portion of citizens are unaware of the policy process or how to contact their local representatives. By informing constituents on how to reach out to their representatives, it taught me how community members can be directly involved in holding their leaders accountable. The grievances of one may be the grievances of all. With the skills I have acquired, I aspire to contribute to adding clarity amongst those who are unaware and addressing the local issues within my community. Essentially, I am driven to understand how marginalized communities are overlooked in government decisions. I want people to understand that the opportunities we are given aren't just to benefit ourselves, but to benefit those who don't have the power to create change. I want to represent my own story, but also countless other experiences and backgrounds to make a difference in the world. Since the government has previously restricted the youth and community from voicing their thoughts, I advocate for those who do not have the voice to do so. 



I have been interested in urban planning for a long time. My very first introduction to it was through the game SimCity, which I have been consistently playing for 7 years now. However, my introduction to urban planning truly began when I reached high school, where I had the opportunity to take AP Human Geography. This class taught me about urban planning concepts, such as land-use policy, suburbanization, urban sprawl, and new urbanism. But most notably urban renewal and redlining. These practices have shaped the socioeconomic landscape of cities by furthering segregation, displacing black and brown communities, and preventing people of color from building generational wealth. Learning about these policies from the 60s struck a cord because I grew up in Compton, a community directly impacted by these practices. I spent the majority of my childhood there, moving to Norwalk when I was 13.

Growing up in Compton, schools in the area weren't the best. My parents, who grew up in those schools, saw how detrimental those environments have been to many of their peers' outcomes. Overworked and underpaid teachers, violent crime, normalized and widespread drug use, lack of information or aspiration for higher education, poor academics, and indifferent faculty are just a few things they experienced in their time there. So my parents found ways to put me in schools located in neighboring cities. By the time I was 11, I moved schools often as my parents continuously searched for better opportunities. Discriminatory planning policies such as redlining impacted the ability for minorities to buy homes but it also impacted funding for education. Redlining confined communities to under-resourced areas with poorly funded schools and limited their access to educational opportunities. This continues to perpetuate cycles of poverty and inequality, as students in these areas continue to face barriers to receiving quality education and preparation for higher education.

The concepts introduced in those pages of my human geography textbook were my lived experience and I grew up seeing the effects of its consequences. Since then my fascination and curiosity of urban planning has only deepened. I dedicated my senior project, a research paper, to affordable housing and how it is impacted by public policy, such as single-family zoning, minimum lot sizes, and parking requirements. As well as unpacks the discriminatory past of American urban planning. As part of my research, I also reached out to a local community organization, Norwalk Unides, who focus on local housing, transportation, and environmental justice issues. I am now a member of Norwalk Unides and have done some work with them. So far I have attended a city council meeting on rent control and redevelopment, and attended a meeting with the Department of Toxic Substances Control about shutting down Phibro-Tech, a hazardous polluting factory that the neighborhood of Los Nietos has been fighting for 25 years. I have also participated in cooking and distributing food for our unhoused neighbors with Southeast LA Comida No Bombas, another community group affiliated with Norwalk Unides.

Throughout my high school career, I also have focused many of my classes and extracurriculars around STEM, especially engineering and computer science. But in college, I plan to major in Urban Studies, Economics, or Geography, pursue a career in urban planning, and focus on social justice issues within this field.



10+ years of learning Chinese. A score of 5 on the AP Chinese test. 4+ years of learning Spanish. Taking the AP Spanish class at my school. I love learning about different languages. I don't just love the grammar, I love the feelings that different languages can exhibit and I love how languages interact; both of these factors are extremely important to how we understand each other, especially in the US, where we're known for our diversity, including language diversity.

One key difference I discovered is that different languages use different strategies to convey attitudes. In English, we often change our tone inflection, as in sarcasm. However, in both Spanish and Mandarin, sarcasm is almost never used. Instead, Spanish uses a different set of verb conjugations to convey feelings of uncertainty. Chinese is different; since Mandarin is a tonal language, it's impossible to change tones while maintaining the same semantic meaning; in addition, Mandarin doesn't conjugate verbs to create tenses; therefore Mandarin-speakers more often use a wide range of idioms to express attitudes.

This difference means that we need to be more cognizant of the way that service workers interact with immigrants. If a Chinese immigrant seeks help from an English-speaking lawyer, there may be miscommunication because the English speaker may mistake an accent for sarcasm or the Chinese speaker may not understand the different attitudes, such as sarcasm, coming from the English speaker. Miscommunication is never good, but when dealing with the legal system, the issue can be exacerbated; miscommunication can become a significant obstacle to equal protection under the law, and even block life-saving citizenship.

Another important linguistic concept is a calque. Calques occur when one language uses a literal translation of another language's word. My solid understanding of English/Mandarin/Spanish helped me understand calques on a deeper level. In Spanish, "momento de la verdad" is a phrase used to describe a moment right before death in bullfights. English literally translated it to "moment of truth", describing a very important moment. In Mandarin, "xi nao" means to literally "wash brain", which is where English created the word "brainwashing", a result of cultural interaction during the Korean War.

As mental health becomes increasingly talked about, it's interesting to study how different cultures name the phenomenon. "Mental health" initially started as an English term, but as cultures interact (and the mental health of Generation Z becomes more and more concerning), different languages are creating words for this term. However, these words don't always translate well. For example, many mental health initiatives fall short; they don't address mental health issues that lay beyond the surface with communities of color because of language barriers with naming symptoms.

The US is the land of immigrants, but our services don't reflect that. Did you know that Asian Americans are three times less likely to seek mental health services than White people? Did you

also know that only 20% of Latinos with a mental disorder talk about it with a primary care physician? Communities of color may be largely discouraged from pursuing help when they don't feel that they are being truly heard and understood. However, there is hope; when we understand how our languages inform our psychology and communication, we can better address the issues that arise from them.

I am considering 2 career paths, both rooted in my curiosity in languages and desire to work with people. Option 1 would be to become an Immigration Lawyer and Option 2 would be to become a mental health professional. In either, I hope to effectively use my knowledge of language to truly and deeply connect with people of color, and use my background in public speaking (Speech and Debate, Mock Trial Captain) to give them voices and advocate for their needs.

However, the end goal isn't just to educate myself to help others. In each respective path, I hope to make all professionals in my field more versed in cultural care and revolutionize the way we think of mental health/legal help.



By 2050, 70% of the world's population will reside in urban areas, presenting one of society's most pressing challenges: environmental sustainability amidst urbanization.

As a U.S. Earth Science Olympiad (USESO) national winner, environmental sustainability and public policy have been integral to my life for the past 7 years, whether in research, software development, USA Olympiads, or community service. My endeavors have earned me 13 international and 16 national honors for my published book, research papers, apps, TEDx talk, filmmaking, leadership, etc.

I. Research and Internships: Catalysts for Policy Change and Urban Planning Skill Development

<u>Research #1 in Computational Environmental Science</u>: Soil Pollution Visualization for Intervention Policymaking

While studying for my college Physical Geology course in 9th grade, I stumbled upon Dr. Han's online seminar about soil pollution. Concerned about how underground heavy metals ended up deposited on the surface and polluted the environment, I reached out to Dr. Han. Before I knew it, I became his protégé for my two-year research in Computational Environmental Science to develop a heavy metal pollution visualization tool (U.S. patent pending), applying programming skills I'd gained through years of USA Computing Olympiad training. This incredibly rewarding research experience ignited my passion for urban pollution control and intervention policymaking.

Environmental Public Health Internship at UC Berkeley: A CDC-funded Data Mining Project to Inform Policy Change

After attending an environmental public health panel my school co-hosted with UC Berkeley's Tracking California program, I took the initiative to reach out to the program and secured a summer internship as an Environmental Data Engineer to work on a project funded by the CDC. Using my research and programming skills, I developed a multi-source data mining tool and an interactive web application to visualize environmental health data profiles by counties across California to inform public health and policy change, especially for pollution-dense and disaster-prone areas.

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Financial Analyst Internship at Disneyland: Valuable Skills Applicable to Urban Planning

In an effort to expand my perspective and enhance my understanding of urban planning principles, I sought opportunities to apply my skills and knowledge in a diverse setting. This led me to join Disneyland as a Financial Analysis Intern last summer, where I managed the budget for a large-scale "Disneyland After Dark" event at Disneyland Resort. I collaborated with every department included in the event, including entertainment, food & beverage, and merchandise, to integrate a profitable yet realistic budget and ensure the financial accountability of each department. After discussing countless variables with professionals in almost every field, I produced a comprehensive budget plan and presented it to senior managers of all involved departments. This valuable experience solidified my interest in urban environmental planning, significantly enhancing my skills in financial management, interdisciplinary collaboration, and strategic decision-making.

<u>Research #2 in Environmental Behavioral Science</u>: Intervention Policies to Address Consumer Behavior

Shocked at the pressing issue of electronic waste (e-waste)—the fastest-growing waste stream in our technology-dependent society—I aimed to understand why its global recycling rate was only 17%, which had posed significant environmental risks and material loss. I delved into extensive research on the determinants of consumers' e-waste recycling behaviors and published a journal paper with an international Best Paper Award, venturing into the new field of Environmental Behavioral Science. Learning how research-informed intervention strategies could address recycling behavioral determinants, including "sentimental attachment," "data security," and "economic incentives," was very eye-opening to me.

II. Translating my Behavior Research into Activism: Award-Winning Apps and Nonprofit Leadership

Research-Informed Environmental Apps: <u>A Congressional App Challenge National</u> <u>Winner</u>

To translate my behavioral research into practice, I created a multitude of innovative research-based environmental apps, including a phone reselling/donation/recycling mobile app called "\$ellPhone" (on display in the U.S. Capitol as a national winner of the Congressional App Challenge) to address the stockpiling of 1 billion smartphones in U.S. households. "\$ellPhone" makes it easier for people to resell their phones for profit, donate them to a good cause, such as veterans and domestic violence victims in need, or recycle them to reduce e-waste globally.

Initiatives Towards a Greener Planet: Founding a Nonprofit Organization and Global Recycling Campaigns

Burdened to act, I set out to found the nonprofit <u>Teens Against E-waste</u> (TAE) to develop educational websites, international award-winning film documentaries, and eventually, my biggest idea yet, launch the <u>One Million Batteries</u> (1MB) campaign aimed to recycle 1,000,000 used household batteries.

I first began collecting used batteries at senior apartments near my home. As soon as I explained the purpose of my visit, the manager, Richie, lit up and exclaimed, "We've been waiting for you!" and handed me four bags of batteries! In just two weeks, the seniors gave me 1,500 batteries to recycle.

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With growing confidence, I reached out to my school to host 1MB's first official school drive. Looking at the collected 12,000 batteries on my garage floor, I felt so empowered!

One million might sound intimidating, but thanks to our growing network of volunteers across 56 branches in 6 countries, a single spark quickly evolved into a blazing fire. Even Google, after a month of coordination between me and 9 sustainability managers and staff, partnered with us to host 1MB drives at various sites, including its headquarters! With the generous support of schools, communities, media coverage, and legislative collaboration, we have successfully raised awareness of the e-waste crisis among millions.

My passion soon grew into advocating for youth activism through my <u>TEDx talk</u>, published book, and training workshops to raise future young leaders. In just three years, over 1,400 students have collectively recycled 470,000+ batteries and 90,000+ pounds of e-waste (e.g., computers, TVs, phones), reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 220,000 pounds and recovering \$50,000 worth of precious metals!

III. Public Policy Change Efforts: Advocating for Urban Environmental Solutions

Advocating for E-waste Policy Change

Venturing on, I realized that relying solely on volunteers to collect batteries would not solve the root of the pressing issue that three billion batteries end up in America's landfills each year. Consequently, I pivoted our grassroots movements towards advocating for policy change. I convinced and worked with my district's Operations Director to allocate funding to establish a district-wide permanent battery recycling program covering 20 schools and 30,000 students. Along with a district-published press release titled "Joshua Lou Calls for Policy Change," I also discussed environmental issues and policies with district, community, and government leaders, including Superintendent Matsuda (who wrote the Foreword for my published book), Google sustainability managers, nonprofit CEOs, college presidents, professors, California DOT director, mayors, etc.

Meeting With U.S. Congressman Alan Lowenthal

When some of our volunteers were rejected by government-run waste collection centers, I was utterly shocked. Thinking e-waste recycling was simply a funding issue, I tried hard to seek funding support from various organizations and 15 government officials at the city and county levels. However, only after I scheduled a meeting with U.S. Congressman Alan Lowenthal—where he sympathized through similar challenges he faced with his "Break Free From Plastic Pollution" bill—did I realize how broken the recycling system was in our individualism-dominant nation. Though seemingly straightforward, e-waste recycling can be unexpectedly complex; it is a cyclical problem that goes beyond funding and requires discussion of circular economy, sustainable design, government policymaking, and even national security. The need for collaborative action and effective policymaking has never been more urgent.

Joining Assemblywoman Quirk-Silva's Young Legislators Program

Through these conversations, I was compelled to seek more leadership development training and deepen my understanding of the inner workings of the government and the legislative process. I joined California State Assemblywoman Quirk-Silva's Young Legislators Program and gained incredibly precious insight into the complexities of addressing pressing urban societal issues. I've also deeply enjoyed interacting with influential community leaders, discussing urban planning

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initiatives, and exploring potential paths toward a career in public service. I'm very thankful for the invaluable opportunities this program has provided!

IV. Looking Forward at Stanford University

Moving forward, I have been challenging myself by taking numerous college- and AP-level political science, earth science, and engineering courses. Now, I'm more convinced than ever that addressing urban environmental concerns and enacting policy change requires an interdisciplinary outlook fusing various fields. Having recently been admitted to Stanford University, I cannot wait to pursue the Urban Environmental Planning and Public Policy interdisciplinary major along with a minor in Computer Science. Your scholarship will enable me to study the political, social, scientific, and technological dimensions of today's urban environmental challenges to help me reach my long-term goal—becoming a policymaker at the intersection of urban planning, environmental sustainability, and technology, where I can advocate for innovative policies and implement solutions that positively impact communities and the environment. In order to scale up the organization and increase its reach, created a structure of local branches, each having a local branch leader, reminiscent of a business structure of local franchises. taught to create starter kits, tutorials, and flier templates for new TAE branch leaders. Using computer science skills, coded widgets for the TAE/1MB websites that show a live count of the total number of recycled batteries and a scrolling feed of recent results. This has proven extremely effective in motivating young volunteers who can submit their latest battery collection outcomes and in exchange receive a TAE certificate, which designed with thoughtful creative details. ability to market, structure, and move the organization forward is propelling TAE's growth and successful campaigns.

Throughout TAE's workshops, newsletters, and initiatives I have been able to observe uniquely motivational and inspiring leadership as well as infectious personality. In particular, has strived to keep TAE branch leaders focused and engaged in many creative ways. devised a reward system and set up the attribution of awards, such as Branch of the Month, Branch of Creativity, and the President's Volunteer Service Award, that proved extremely effective in driving



branch leaders' engagement and motivation. On many occasions also sent personal emails to branch leaders to suggest next steps, coach them on how to implement them effectively, and invite them to share their experience with other branches. approachable, humble demeanor and supportive actions have helped many branch leaders become more and more confident in their ability to effect a change, suggest new ideas, and influence their peers. In addition, has been running regular workshops with all TAE members for the introduction of new tools and tutorials, the presentation of new initiatives, and the announcement of TAE branch leader awards. In a recent one-hour TAE online workshop, inspired fifteen student speakers to share their testimonials about the local recycling events they organized in their own state or country.

also possesses an exceptional ability to create a sense of belonging and community where youngsters feel empowered to act together to make the world they inherited from previous generations a better place. documented this journey in an eBook titled "Youth Activism: Teens Against E-waste and Our Quest to Collect 1 Million Batteries to Save the Planet", which has earned two international book awards and has been on Amazon's #1 Best Seller list in an eBook category for teens and young adults. In this inspiring and engaging account, presents a blueprint for meaningful action also applicable to other causes than own. In doing so clearly shows to our youngsters that they can truly feel empowered in this world.

In addition to being an effective, selfless, and benevolent leader. is also able to turn to academic research and analysis to generate novel and actionable insights. Using the findings of review of over thirty studies on the psychological factors affecting electronic waste recycling, which won a Best Paper Award for at the Eurasia Research International Conference and subsequently published in the *Journal* of Environmental Science and Engineering, cleverly decided to start with battery recycling as a first step. That proved to be incredibly effective both as a vehicle to raise awareness of electronic waste and to set a goal for young recruits that is both challenging and attainable using very few material resources. research findings also resonated with me as I have personally been very reluctant to bring my own hard drives and used phones to an e-waste center because of the security concerns related to the trove of personal and sensitive data that remains on these devices. ability to integrate evidence-based findings to direct and develop activism is quite exceptional in such a young person.

indefatigable action in pursuit of vision has led to notable developments over the past two years. Thanks to sociable personality and warm energy, managed to navigate complicated corporate procedures to convince Google to



partner with TAE's 1MB campaign and promote used battery collection drives on their campuses, including at their Mountain View headquarters. Using outreach success story, has now inspired many TAE volunteers to reach out to two hundred other companies and organizations. In addition to this expansion of the 1MB campaign, launched TAE's second global campaign, WEEEcycle, to collect electronic waste other than batteries. reached out to the presidents of nearby colleges who then fully supported massively successful WEEEcycle events hosted on their campuses that invited all residents of nearby cities to deposit their accumulated e-waste for proper recycling. The events were covered by several local news outlets thus furthering the mission of TAE by increasing the general public's awareness of e-waste and of TAE's actions for their benefit.







I was miserable.

While I sat in the dorm by myself, I marinated in self-pity. I had not slept all night and my stomach was twisting itself into knots. I kept rubbing my eyes to wipe away the tears from the panic. But I knew what was wrong; I was making myself sick because I was terrified of debating for the first time. I was at a week-long debate camp, and it was finally time for my first practice round. I forced myself to go through with it despite the fact that I had zero idea what the debate topic was about or what to say. But quitting seemed unacceptable. I stuttered and stammered my way through cross examination and blinked back oceans of tears as I gave my first speech. Those humiliating forty-five minutes were finally over and.... I loved it. I loved debate. I decided then and there to never quit.

Over the past five years of my life, I have been a competitor in a national speech and debate league called STOA USA. Little did I know that honing my skills as a public speaker would spark an intense passion to pursue public policy.

As I have grown and researched I have seen the need for young people who are equipped to speak boldly for what they believe and think critically. A recent poll by the Cato Institute found that 62% of Americans have a political opinion they are afraid to share. (Ekins) In our modern day we are surrounded by political gridlock; everyone hides behind slogans and political parties, and very few understand how policy actually works. It's no wonder that voter turnout has been among the lowest in history and that family and friends cannot have simple political conversations without things getting heated. Even more alarmingly is that only 10-20% of our youth are interested in public policy careers, according to a Harvard Youth Poll. (Harvard)

There is a need for well-read, intelligent, and passionate youth who can rise up and don the mantle of responsibility for the generations to come. And I have a great desire to be one of those people.

When I was fifteen, I started thinking about what my future would look like. I knew that I enjoyed public speaking, researching political policy, and experimenting in debate theory, but it wasn't till I attended a summer camp with the Young America's Foundation that my love of public policy really sparked. While at that camp, I learned a lot about former President Ronald Reagan. I even had the privilege of visiting his ranch in Santa Barbara, California. What I realized during that camp was that men like Ronald Reagan were ordinary people who lived ordinary lives until they were called upon to serve their country. And when they heard the call of duty, they answered it and never looked back. I realized that I wanted to follow in the footsteps of Reagan "the Great Communicator", so the last two years of my highschool journey I have been pursuing that dream.

Despite my first debate experience, I was true to my resolve and never gave up. After five years of stiff competition, goal-setting, and my fair share of failure, I am now ranked second in the nation in combined speech and debate rankings. Beyond the accolades, debate has been a crucible that taught me competitive excellence, humility, and work ethic. The skills I've learned allow me to confidently address rooms of adults better than most of my peers. It has also given me many opportunities to make an impact on my community. For example, I was asked to present a fifteen minute speech in front of several hundred community members at a local event. The president of the Heritage Foundation was present and offered me a coveted spot as his personal assistant when I am of age. In addition, Arlene Wohlgemuth, Chairman of the Golden State Policy Council, invited me to be one of her personal assistants.

My dream is to attend Patrick Henry College in Virginia, where I aspire to join their debate team, major in Government, and minor in Music. Ultimately, I envision a career in Washington D.C., perhaps working for a campaign or serving as a secretary. I could also pursue an internship with a policy think-tank like the Heritage Foundation. My passion is to use my skills to defend our country and make a difference in our political landscape one policy at a time. I know that I have what it takes; I only need the chance.





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"Hello. My name is and I will be translating for my mother."

When I was young, I developed horrible anxiety translating English to Mandarin and vice-versa for my mother. My limited knowledge of both languages while simultaneously fearing that I would translate something incorrectly and potentially cause more problems was overwhelming. I often struggled with the discomfort of speaking to grown-ups about grown-up issues, translating important documents and phone calls, and fumbling for the best word to use in both languages. At the same time, however, it made me realize: who else in my community could do this for her? This was the driving force that pushed me to become more fluent in both languages, not only for my benefit, but also for my mother and others in similar situations.

As a of a single immigrant mother, I lived a double life. While my mother had always expected me to excel in my education, she also relied on me to assist her with daily functions at home. Consequently, assisting her meant I had less time to focus on my school work and extracurriculars, and occasionally resulting in tardiness and absences at school. During my last two years of high school, helping my mother became more frequent due to the sudden loss of her job. In addition to my studies, I began registering for government assistance, helped my mother look for and apply for jobs, interviewed people to rent a room in our home, and created a renters contract. In order to help contribute, I also took on a part-time job, while fulfilling my duties as the captain of my high school dance team and president of several clubs on campus.

Growing up, I realized that there was not much community support for my family. Our Mandarin-speaking background created a barrier in an environment where Spanish and English were more prevalent. I became my mother's "community." I often recall vivid stories my mother would share of the hardships she faced when she was younger in her home country. These stories of poverty and adversity instilled in her resilience and perseverance. My mother has inspired me to help others in similar situations so they can receive the help they need to be successful in their community. After taking Race & Ethnicity, a sociology course at a community college, I realized that there are many more marginalized communities that are in need of help and support. Many other immigrant parents in those communities

have unsupported language access and rely on their children to help manage adult responsibilities. Seeing first-hand the impact the legal system can have on these groups of people, I knew I had to become a "community" for them as well.

With majoring in political science and minoring in environmental science, I aim to become an environmental justice attorney and assist those in marginalized communities, as I understand the pressure and disadvantages that come with it. My goal is to represent the rights of those in marginalized communities who bear the disproportionate burdens of environmental injustices. I initiated my journey by contacting over 20 organizations and centers that focus on helping communities against environmental injustice. These efforts successfully connected with UCLA Institute of the Environment & Sustainability, who not only acknowledged but also featured a poster I designed across their social media platforms. I plan to extend my impact by actively engaging in a college organization that aligns with my passion for community support and language accessibility. Participating in social justice opportunities, legal aid clinics, and partner organizations can provide me with the chance to apply my future legal expertise in a practical setting and make a difference in the lives of marginalized communities. This is not just a career path but a journey fueled by passion and a commitment to address systemic injustices and ensure that every individual, regardless of their background, has the right to a healthy and sustainable environment.



Many children grow up hearing stories of faraway lands — fairy tales with pristine princess dresses, pixie dust, and happy endings. While I was often the one telling the stories to my little brother, I still heard grand stories from my mother, ones of resilience and our family's past.

My mother was born amidst the Khmer Rouge genocide in Cambodia. Shortly after, her and her family scaled the mountains bordering Vietnam and found refuge in a United Nations camp. As my mother often says, she grew up eating the "United Nations' rice."

From a young age, I understood the power of government in our lives. Government was the force that destroyed villages and separated families. But government could be the protector that helped save my family, a catalyst for progress and a potential future.

Inside my family's story, I found a fascination for the world and, importantly, for the possibility of change.

I am inspired by humanitarianism and even more so by the humans behind it. It was only later on that I realized how important people are in the process. During middle school and high school, my interest in activism heightened. I grew up taking care of my little brother while my parents worked in the food court, which meant I had lots of time that was evenly distributed between reading and Disney Channel.

Reading brought me my love for history. I explored the hidden sides of my history class. Then I moved to reading classics and from the sources we examined. When I picked up my first James Baldwin text, it was final — my love for exploration of our world's problems and past was immovable.

Reading political philosophy brought me back to where I started. I was again a young girl with a heavy heart and thoughts of distant places. But now I understood more.

In reflecting on the stories of my mother, I think not only about the United Nations but my grandmother. Even in the face of terror, she served others. On the minefields to Vietnam, she saved a man whose eye had been blown out. From their small apartment with a near-empty pantry, she fed visiting Buddhist monks.

My mother tells me I inherited my grandmother's heart.

When I began community organizing, I thought of that heart as a burden. Years later, I know it is part of my power. I volunteered with a local mutual aid organization and later took over; I searched for opportunities to help with racial injustice and had the privilege of researching for a municipal police accountability board. I worked alongside people I admired, and I found pieces of that change I sought along the way.

Forming my own organization for social justice and literary justice. Representing my peers on the district and state-wide level. Interning at a nonprofit and visiting D.C. Serving as youth commissioner for our county district. Events, research, speeches, and more. At the center of it all was people.

In my future, I want to serve my community. This may look a multitude of ways, and I am a multitude of "Katie"s. Whether it is in the nonprofit sector for housing, legal advocacy via the American Civil Liberties Union, or perhaps the government or United Nations, I know that the power is in the people's hands. And although they may never be absolute, I am forever in pursuit of more "happily ever after"s for the world. I am grateful for my heritage and the ability it has given me to pay it forward.



Orange. It was 9 p.m., and yet, the skies glowed unnaturally orange. My brow furrowed as I gazed up at the muggy, smog-filled night sky of Los Angeles. The urban skyscape surrounding my father's convenience store was a far cry from the sparkling stars that blanketed my small hometown an hour away. Pondering this atmospheric contrast, I turned to my father for answers.

"It's just light pollution," he yawned. His nonchalant response startled me. For him, long years in the big city have made the unnatural amber nights as ordinary as the daytime's blue. But to me, it was a glaring issue. The next weekend, I followed my father to his store as usual. These trips were our bonding moments, filling in the loneliness during the countless weekdays he was away at work. Though he toiled away for my entire childhood, we barely scraped by. It was shipment day, a weekly routine filled with carrying endless boxes, stocking shelves with car fresheners, and arranging candy at the front. But today, something felt different. Exiting the freeway, I peered out to see the endless rows of tents scattered near the exit of Freeway 91. My nose crinkled at the stench of urine in the parking lot behind our store, and the thick smog emanating from nearby factories felt suffocating. Stuck in the traffic of congested, narrow roads, I began questioning the sustainability of urban practices.

Carrying groceries to a customer's car, I noticed some neighborhood kids playing nearby, making toys out of discarded styrofoam cups and plastic utensils. The scene struck me as a jarring reminder of the harsh realities that children in urban cities face—a stark contrast from the clean playspaces every child deserves.

Spurred into action, I initiated sustainable practices at my father's store, reducing the use of plastic bags and recycling shipment boxes. I organized morning clean-ups every Saturday to pick up trash, inspiring neighboring stores in the strip mall to follow my lead. We tackled debris that littered parking lots and storefronts, tirelessly clearing endless remnants of urban neglect. "We do [public service] because it's a chance to work hard at work worth doing."

Fictional Indiana Governor Leslie Knope in one line, had just ignited a paradigm shift within my world.

It was April of 2020, and I had just spent the last three weeks binge-watching "Parks and Recreation" to distract myself from the uncertainty in the world around me.

Though initially a distraction, *Parks and Rec* also changed everything for me. I wasn't a stranger to politics – some of my earliest memories involve going to vote with my parents and when my grandparents organized with their neighbors to install speed humps on their street – but until I watched *Parks*, I didn't think *I* could be a part of it.

I often cite Leslie and Ben's political activism in *Parks and Rec* as what inspired me to start taking action. When I was fourteen, after watching the effects of illegal fireworks on dogs and veterans with PTSD, I wrote to my local city council to see what could be done and had a meeting with the Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department in response, where we discussed the real, behind the scenes action that our governments take every day. From this, I learned that just because it seems that the government isn't doing anything from the outside, there is action being taken on the inside that we don't always see.

The next year, I joined the activist groups Voters of Tomorrow and Women in Politics, two organizations that aim to make politics accessible and applicable to young people, especially those who are historically underrepresented in political spheres. It has been beyond rewarding to see my work help change things, whether that is inspiring another young woman to see herself as being able to be a force in politics or by creating materials to help other students run voter registration drives on their school campuses.

I founded Diamond Bar High School's only politics club, Politics Society, with my friend Nina. Together, we've registered hundreds of students to vote and brought local government officials to campus to make government and politics accessible to our students.

They say that "Politics ain't Beanbag" (essentially, Politics is Hard). Politics is hard. It's not an easy task and it takes a lot of tenacity to be able to spend time in that sphere. But where others see dysfunction and chaos, I see an opportunity to make a mark on the nation's identity.


I see an opportunity to bring awareness to youth issues and help give young people a seat at the table. I've been privileged enough to have positive interactions with my

community leaders and have their trust in me, but I know not everyone has that experience. I want to change that. I want to make politics more accessible to all people.

I see potential to help bridge gaps across divides, whether across nations, the political aisle, or even our own neighbors. I see so many ways to change people's lives, whether that's through bringing a community together through a city-sponsored community event or through legislation as big as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill.

I look forward to making a mark on our nation's identity. I want to go to law school and practice corporate antitrust law to ensure that corporations aren't taking advantage of consumers through monopolies and junk fees. I want to work for the government, perhaps on Capitol Hill, the State Department, or in the West Wing. I've floated with the idea of even running for office someday. But all I know right now is that I have a wide-open future with millions of possibilities and opportunities waiting for me to take advantage of. They say that, "Every generation gets a chance to change the world/Pity the nation that won't listen to you boys and girls", and I look forward to being a part of that change, because, to me, that is work worth doing.







I have dedicated the last five years to serving on the Simi Valley Youth Council.

The Youth Council is an advisory board to the City Council, committed to identifying, and raising awareness on issues concerning Simi Valley youth.

Youth Council empowers me to be civically engaged in a uniquely productive capacity while understanding the workings of my local city government. It gives me an opportunity to collaborate with my peers, sharing resources and working towards a common purpose.

Our goal is to move the needle - by getting more people talking, providing information, and liaising with public officials, we enable our community and our decision-makers to open the door to change. I find this hands-on engagement rewarding, and have come to cherish the work and the relationships deeply.

Together, we have led initiatives about suicide prevention, school infrastructure, mental health and substance abuse via fairs, forums, and panel discussions, raising community consciousness and fueling cross-generational conversations. These efforts have allowed our city to unite in a meaningful way and promoted action on key youth issues.

For example, in 2021, as part of the Tobacco Use and Prevention committee, we conducted surveys and interviews to gather information on students' experiences on smoking and vaping and their opinions on ordinances limiting the use of such products. We drafted a Tobacco Retailer Licensing ordinance and a Secondhand Smoke Ordinance and made a recommendation to the city for its implementation.

In 2023, we hosted a Teen Wellness Fair where we invited businesses, community, and student organizations to share mental health resources including nutrition, physical fitness, meditation, and opportunities for social connections. As Chair of the Mental Health Committee, I researched district and state policy regarding student mental health and spread awareness via our social media that, as of January 2023, California permits students excused absences for mental health. I was instrumental in the development of a comprehensive survey for high schools to determine the most pressing concerns surrounding student mental health; the survey is now sent annually to all high schools in the city, serving as a diagnostic for future youth councils. I served as Master of Ceremonies for the 2023 Annual Youth Town Hall on "Social Media and its Impact on Mental Health" with 500+ attendees from Simi Valley schools.

My role as Council Chair this year is to be a facilitator, guiding members in our initiatives, and establishing systems to secure our future efforts. My success hinges upon my ability to be both independently driven, as well as to encourage and inspire the same kind of will-to-action in others.

Since I joined the Youth Council, it has grown in influence, becoming well-known in our community, allowing us to raise more funds and host more events. We have expanded our scope spearheading an Unplugged Day, Escape Rooms, and a Multicultural Fair. We have doubled the amount of time and effort with which we approach our initiatives, and community participation in our events has increased commensurately.

Youth Council has been a transformative experience which has sparked my interest in government and public policy. It has helped me realize that collaboration can unite people in the pursuit of effective solutions to the world's problems. One day, I aspire to work in government to solve problems at a greater scale.

WIP Needed

Ever since fifth grade, I've had a keen interest in politics. I paid close attention to the 2016 presidential election, and upon seeing the roster of candidates debate their different beliefs and try to convince the voters their way is the "right way", I decided that I wanted to pursue a career in serving the people. When I began to attend E.O. Green Middle School, I continued to explore what type of job I could hold while serving the people. After a conversation with a few of my teachers, I concluded that public law would be the best opportunity for me to do what I love, with a preference for prosecution.

It was in high school when I interned at the Public Defenders Office to challenge my own beliefs, which has now flipped my future goal to work with the Ventura County Public Defenders Office rather than the District Attorney's Office. I had lunch with Chief Public Defender of Felonies Michael Rodriguez, who told me why he believes in what he does without any doubt. He told me people often ask him how he has a clear conscience, to which he told me he is giving people the best counsel he can give them, as every American is entitled to. I also conversed with a few other attorneys and employees such as Chief Public Defender Tim Quinn, Law Clerk Melissa Peña, and my supervisor Zeke Berkeley who all wanted to serve because they believed that this form of public service was allowing them to do the right thing.

This past summer I also had the opportunity to intern with Vanessa Frank, a well-known immigration attorney from Ventura County. Having met Vanessa after serving with Swap Meet Justice(SMJ), a free monthly citizenship fair, I was inspired to give back to the predominantly Hispanic and immigrant community in the Ventura area. When not working at her office, I help her at SMJ with putting up flyers throughout the community, speaking to government officials in support of SMJ, and meeting with partners. Vanessa is the reason that I gave one of the best impromptu speeches of my life, bringing me to speak to the Ventura County Board of

Supervisors to secure funding for SMJ. She asked that I speak in support of SMJ, with the hopes that we get the expected simple majority to vote in favor of funding. By the time I completed my speech, a few others spoke and we left the room with \$150,000 for our nonprofit organization. Vanessa Frank is by all means a large source of inspiration for me, as she is extremely busy with her own practice; however, she chooses to spend her time managing a free immigration fair that benefits a largely underserved community in Ventura County.

It was also in high school when I began attending weekly beach cleanups at Port

Hueneme Beach with Port Hueneme City Council member Steven Gama. I found we share a lot
in common including going to Hueneme Beach to surf, swim, and hanging out with our friends
for as long as we can remember, so we both had a mutual passion for helping the beach
community. After talking to Mr. Gama, I learned that even before holding his political position
he cleaned the beach. The weekly hour-long beach cleanups had me encouraged, as seeing a
local politician who was selflessly giving up time to pursue a communal project like this wasn't
something I thought I'd see. Since then, Mr. Gama has invited me to assist him at an enchilada
dinner at the local VA to raise money for foster youth, which has further reaffirmed my pursuit of
public service.

Another large source of my interest in public service is Dr. Kim Stephenson, my AVID teacher. Dr. Stephenson has been providing my class with community volunteer opportunities since we first began attending Oxnard Middle College(OMC) during COVID-19, with her being the one to introduce me to Swap Meet Justice. My first time meeting her was before I even attended OMC when I went with my family to pick up a sign for her Supervisor campaign in 2019. While she ultimately lost, she began another campaign for the same position this year. I have on my own accord begun to assist her campaign, as I know her fairly well as an individual

who truly cares about bettering the community. Not only does she provide her students with opportunities to better themselves and get involved, but she herself gets her hands dirty, attending the vast majority of these community service events herself, and not simply for photo ops.

My interest does not solely come from the inspiration that I've gotten from politicians and community members I've met throughout the years. I am a long-time member of my high school's ASB, earning the position of Alternate to the Student Representative to the Board of Trustees. I've also fundraised thousands of dollars for my ASB, securing the prom venues for the classes of 2024-2026. While it might not seem like much, it was honest work that supported my little high school community greatly.

As a second-generation Mexican-American, my family constantly stressed the need for a good-paying job and higher education. Because of this, I opted to attend the academically rigorous, full-time dual enrollment program of OMC. This also has contributed to my want to serve the people of Ventura County, as I maintain a sense of identity in the dominantly Hispanic community. Since attending OMC, I've taken countless political science courses at Oxnard College. I am on track to graduate with five associate degrees, two of them being in Political Science and Law, Public Policy, and Society. Every political science course I've taken has been incredibly interesting, every lecture and video being more interesting than the last. An entire subject on the concept of politics and how it works has helped shape me into the individual I am today, wanting to serve my fellow residents to the best of my ability. I plan on continuing my political science pursuit in my four-year education, with the hopes of double majoring in political science and philosophy.

My ultimate goal is to attend law school and return to Ventura County, where I hope to serve as a public defender with an emphasis on immigration. I recall when speaking to the Port Hueneme City Council to promote Swap Meet Justice, I discussed how inspiring all of these aspects have fueled me to become who I am, and even joked how I hope to maybe one day sit where the city council members were sitting before me. Now, I realize that there was truth to my joke. On top of serving as a public defender, I wish to represent the people of my city in a political capacity, maximizing my public service and serving the community I love. I want to be like Vanessa Frank with her desire to support the immigrant community. I hope to serve the public like Michael Rodriguez, with strong conviction in the right to adequate representation. I look forward to being like Steven Gama, who serves his constituents because he truly wishes to make a positive change. Perhaps I will even be similar to Dr. Stephenson, who inspires the youth to get involved and make a change in their community. And I know that I will continue to be the person I am today, serving and representing the people, changing Ventura County for the better.


SCAG Scholarship Essay




