

SCAG region job creation in 2024 on track to double 2023, but job growth narrowly concentrates in a few industries.


Annual Change in Payroll Jobs in the SCAG Region







Hollywood Jobs Not Rebounding from the 2023 Labor Dispute



Employment in Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services, SCAG Region



Container Volume at Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach




Tourism Also Rebounded Post-Pandemic: Visitor Counts, Hotel Occupancy, and Amusement Park Attendance All Rising







The Outlook for 2025

- No national recession, no regional downturn expected.
- Overhang from the pandemic is fading, which will accelerate economic growth in 2025.
- Growth in logistics, development of large-scale transportation, healthcare, and energy projects, and increases in tourism will carry into 2025.
- Housing construction and sales will rebound as the cycle of interest rates turns lower.
- Immigration responsible for continued job growth, but also highlights the region's housing need.



LAEDC Economic Outlook: Los Angeles County





- Largest county economy in the U.S., Los Angeles County remains a critical economic hub for the SCAG region and the rest of CA.
- Outlook mixed but encouraging with inflation easing. Economic resilience will depend on addressing the county's structural challenges while leveraging its unique assets.
- Job growth concentrated in a few sectors, including healthcare, tourism related industries, education, and trade and logistics.
- Unemployment slightly above pre-pandemic lows.

Los Angeles County Continues its Recovery from Pandemic-Related Disruptions

LAEDC Employment Forecast: Los Angeles County

Change in Payroll Jobs from 2023 to 2026



- The individual poverty rate of 13.7% remains the second highest in the SCAG region, underscoring persistent economic inequality.
- Housing affordability remains challenging. CAR's conventional housing affordability index reveals only 14 percent of households in LA County could afford a median-priced home in 2023.
- Continued remote and hybrid work schedules are to blame for continuing office market struggles. Q3 office vacancies reaching 24%, nearly double the pre-pandemic rate, but leasing activity starting to increase.



Orange County Remains an Economic Heavyweight in Southern California,

but Continues to Face Challenges

 Orange County has the region's lowest seasonally adjusted unemployment rate, highest median household income, lowest poverty rate, and highest educational attainment.

- Orange County continues to face challenges such as workforce housing supply, affordability, and demographic shifts.
- Major new development projects will drive continued economic prosperity and job growth.





Riverside County (+2.6%)




San Bernardino County (+0.9%)

Year-to-Year % Change in Industry Jobs, Inland Empire, September 2022-24



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

Ventura County 2024 Highlights

- Job growth on pace to rise 1.2% for the year.
- Unemployment rate still low at 4.8%.
- Cargo value through the Port of Hueneme at record levels.
- Agriculture is a \$2.2 billion industry with strawberries accounting for 33% of total value.
- Population continues to recede. Ventura County has contracted by 26,000 residents since 2017.
- New housing development has recently accelerated.

Ventura County 2025 Outlook

- The lack of new business growth will limit the extent of job creation in 2025.
- The lack of diverse job opportunities will remain an issue.
- High housing costs, coupled with limited job opportunities, are primary factors driving population out-migration.
- Trade and new development will remain the principal engines of growth.






Five Salient Economic Issues in California

- 5. Will California be affordable for me and my children?




